- Promoting High School Football
- Playoff Restructuring
- Coaches All State and Dream Team Selections

Promoting High School Football

The Association's purpose for existing is to promote high school football. Given the current "difficulties" in drawing participants we've done a series of projects to address our decreasing numbers. (According to the MHSAA between 2015 and 2016 we had 5% fewer high school football players - after factoring in the decrease in general high school enrollment.) What we've done: Two years ago in partnership with the MHSAA we created a video and program materials titled "Safer Than Ever". Last year we asked high school players, a couple college players, administrators and coaches what value they placed on their participation in football/how football had made their lives better, recorded their answers and posted them on our Facebook page: www.facebook.com/Michigan-High-School-Football-Coaches-Association-198325660201724/?pnref=lhc

Currently, we have partnered Amy Teddy (you know Amy from presentations at January clinics) with the Sports Neurology Clinic of the Core Institute, to research the information parents use to make the decision about letting their kids participate in football, where they get their information (TV, social media, word-of mouth, scientific studies), and who they trust to give them accurate information. Amy has recruited help from a research assistant at CMU and will conduct online video conferences with parents who have recently made the decision about letting their kids play contact football. That process will be completed by the end of December. Analysis will be completed by the December holiday season and we should have those results at the January clinic. *If you know of kids that were "held out" of football because their parents would not allow them to participate, we need those parents' names and a contact - phone number and/or email address.

Improving the Playoff System

Last May the MHSFCA and the MIAAA formed a joint committee to discuss how to make the football playoff system more fair and how to make scheduling games more reasonable. The first meeting of the committee included seven members of the MHSFCA and six members of the MIAAA. The first meeting of the committee took place May 7 at Mason High School. The meeting and was hosted by Greg Lattig, President of the MIAAA.

As a starting point the group looked at the "Enhanced Strength of Schedule" proposal put forward by the MHSFCA in 2013. That proposal was approved by the MHSAA Football Committee by a 17-1 vote. It failed in the Rep Council because of the belief that conferences that included more than one "class" would put the larger "class" schools in the conference at a disadvantage and put pressure on those conferences to re-align.

The May Joint MHSFCA/MIAAA meeting concluded that:

- The Class A, B, C, D point system is unfair because of the extreme difference in school enrollment.
- Schools should be divided into Divisions and those divisions should be determined before the season starts.
- The 2016 game results should be applied to the point system laid out in the 2013 SOS proposal. *NOTE: The MHSAA agreed to do this. That has been concluded and the results are currently being analyzed.

If the results of the 2016 SOS point analysis would tend to damage league affiliations significantly, the committee will explore ways to average school enrollments across multi-division conferences (a "Conference Multiplier") to reduce that potential for disruption.

All State Teams and Dream Team

For the first time, the MHSFCA will select All State Teams and a Dream Team. A First Team of 24 players in each of the nine divisions will be selected. Nominations will be made online at MHSFCA.com after week nine. A committee of five members of the MHSFCA Board of Directors will select the teams. The committee will make their selections the following week. Players named to the All State First Teams and to the Dream Team will be announced at MHSFCA.com during the Semi-Finals week of competition. Nominations must be made by coaches who are current members of the in the MHSFCA. MHSFCA members will be notified by email after week nine. Watch your inbox.

Figuring Out Friday Night Rules vs. The Weekend Rules

One of the most frustrating experiences for a high school football official is having coaches and fans holler and scream about a missed rule. Often when this happens, the "yeller" is usually quoting or referencing some rule or situation they saw on TV during a college or pro game, and is not the high school rule. Let's highlight some of the biggest differences in these rules codes.

- There is no such thing as a "tackle box" under HS rules. A QB attempting to throw the ball away must do so with an <u>eligible receiver in the general area</u>. Just because the QB is out of the pocket and the ball reaches the line of scrimmage does not eliminate the QB from being flagged for intentional grounding.
- There is no such thing as an "uncatchable" ball under HS rules in light of pass interference. If there is illegal contact, whether or not the ball was catchable, it is a foul. For pass interference, there now must be contact for a foul to occur; face-guarding with no contact is no longer a foul.
- On extra point plays, if the defense gains possession, the try is over. The defense NEVER return the ball for 2 points. Also, if the holder is to throw and flip the ball to another player on an extra point play, he must rise so that his knee is off the ground when making this pass or flip.
- On a free kick (kick off), the kicking team may not gain possession on a "pooch" kick off where the ball is popped up directly into the air and is first touched/ caught in the air by a member of the kicking team without ever touching the ground. For the kicking team to recover the ball, it must first be touched by R or must first touch the ground (and travel 10 yards) to be legally recovered by K. An onside one-bounce high "pop-up" kick that is driven directly into the ground and bounds high into the air is also illegal.

- The only fouls that result in automatic first downs are the ROUGHINT FOULS ONLY under HS rules....this includes only roughing the passer, roughing the kicker, roughing the snapper and roughing the holder. In general, personal fouls do NOT result in an automatic first at the HS level. Remember that defensive pass interference does not result in an automatic first down....only a 15 yard (or half the distance) penalty.
- Punts and field goal attempts are treated the same way under HS rules.....if a long field goal attempt comes up short and goes out of bounds at the 10 yard line, the defense gets possession of the ball, 1st and 10 at the 10 yard line.
- Under HS rules, whenever a kick (kickoff, punt or FG) breaks the plane of the goal line, the ball is dead immediately. No kick of any kind can be returned once the ball breaks the plane of the goal line.
- The high school targeting rule does NOT require an ejection. Any player guilty of a targeting foul could also be ejected if the act is judged to be flagrant. Targeting under HS rules does not require an automatic ejection; the officials determine whether or not the act was flagrant.

So those are some of the biggest rule differences in the high school game when compared with NCAA and professional rules. One final area where there are very unique rules at the high school level are in OVERTIME, which is only played at the varsity level. Let's finish up this month's summary with some OT reminders.

- Following regulation, a 3:00 minute intermission will take place.
- Each team gets 1 timeout per OT period.... no timeouts carry-over from the 2nd half or previous OT periods.
- Once the 3:00 expires, ONE and ONLY ONE coin toss is conducted at midfield

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before the first OT. The winner of the toss has three options: offense first, defense first, or end of the field. The loser of the toss has the remaining options.

- To start each OT, the offensive team will ALWAYS start out first and goal to go. The starting point will be the 10 yard line unless moved from a penalty on the previous play in regulation or earlier OT period. If the ball has been moved by penalty, it is still first and GOAL TO GO.
- If the defense gains possession at any time, the ball becomes dead immediately. The defense may not return the ball for a score.
- There will be only 1 coin toss. If additional OT periods are needed, then the loser of the coin toss to start the first OT will have the three options for all even OT periods (2nd OT, 4th OT, etc).

- If additional OT periods are needed, there is a 2 minute intermission between those periods in which the options are given to the appropriate teams.
- No try for point will be attempted if the winner of the game has been determined.
- A team can get a first down via an automatic first down foul by the defense (roughing fouls, for example).
- At no time is the offense required to go for 2 points....different than the NCAA rule.

New World, New Needs

he core of our current transfer rule was debated by a predecessor organization 20 years before the Michigan High School Athletic Association existed, in 1904. The MHSAA's first handbook stated the rule in 1925: a one-semester wait to play after a change of schools, unless accompanied by a residential change by the student and parents or guardians. A onesemester wait, with one exception.

In 1971, the number of stated exceptions went from one to twelve.

It's in 1981 when sentiment seemed to shift toward a harder line when the exception from a "broken home" approved by both school principals was toughened to require a completed divorce decree and a form signed by both principals and the MHSAA executive director.

When the transfer rule was adopted, the world was different than today. In 1904, 1925, 1971, even 1981, it was both a different society and youth sports landscape.

There were many more three-sport athletes then than today and many more three-sport coaches. There were

many fewer non-school youth sports programs then than now, and many fewer nonfaculty coaches. And, of course, there was no school of choice.

Increasing year-round single-sport specialization by both students and coaches; ubiquitous specialized sports camps, clinics, trainers, travel teams and leagues – where both students and parents are making friends; more reliance on drop-in, nonfaculty coaches for school teams; and expanding open enrollment laws have combined to change our world.

And they combine to suggest the need for more changes in the MHSAA transfer rule.

New Jersey Mulls Instant Replay for Prep Football

ew Jersey wants to get the call right The Garden State is considering a plan to implement instant replay at the high school level. According to a report from MyCentralJersey.com, the New Jersey State Interscholastic Athletics Association is exploring a pilot program with a few schools that voluntarily agree to participate in the program.

Schools participating in the pilot would be required to have wireless tablets on the sidelines, where replays of game action from cameras in both end zones and the press box would be instantly available to referees.

NJSIAA assistant director Jack DuBois is set to ask for approval for the program from the National Federation of State High School Associations in the next couple days. Carmine Picardo, the coordinator of football officials for NJSIAA, said that DuBois is going to try to feel the NFHS out and see if association leaders have any interest in replay review. "If they have an interest, we are going to sit down and write up a formal proposal to see if we can get them to give us permission next season to experiment with replay review," Picardo told MyCentralJersey.com.

NJSIAA is considering a proposal that would include permission to review only plays involving fumbles, catches, touchdowns and out-of-bounds calls.

High School Football Coach of the Week Program

ach week throughout the 2017 nine-week high school football regular season, one coach that best develops his players' character, discipline, and football skill in addition to emphasizing player health and safety in their program, will be recognized for his commitment to the team, school, and community. The winner is selected by a panel of high school football media members — Mick McCabe (former Detroit Free Press sports writer), Hugh Bernreuter (Saginaw News), Bret Bakita (WOOD Radio-106.9 FM, ESPN 96.1 FM-Fox 17/Grand Rapids), and James Cook (Traverse City Record-Eagle).

This season's program will award \$22,000 to aid in the development and promotion of high school football in the state of Michigan, thanks to contributions from the Detroit Lions, the NFL Foundation, presenting partner, Farm Bureau Insurance of Michigan and associate partner, Gatorade.

Each winning coach during the regular season will receive a \$2,000 donation to his school's football program and a sideline kit, courtesy of Gatorade. At the conclusion of the 2017 Michigan High School Football season, the Lions will also select the High School Football Coach of the Year. This season's Coach of the Year will receive a \$4,000 donation to his school's football program, in addition to the Gatorade sideline kit. All winners receive a certificate signed by Lions' head coach Jim Caldwell and National Football League (NFL) commissioner Roger Goodell, a personalized game ball as well as acknowledgement at an upcoming Lions home game.

Week 1 - Matt Bird, Grand Ledge

Detroit, MI—The Detroit Lions have named Matt Bird of Grand Ledge High School the week one recipient of the 2017 Farm Bureau Insurance of Michigan High School Football Coach of the Week Program. Bird's Grand Ledge Comets defeated Hudsonville 41-14 during opening week of the 2017 high school football season.

Bird is in his 24th season coaching and his 12th season as head coach at Grand Ledge. He has led Grand Ledge

to the playoffs eight times while reaching the Division 1 semi-finals in 2015. His career record is 78-36. Bird has been an assistant coach at Lansing Eastern as well as Grand Ledge and was a member of the 2000 Grand Ledge Division 1 State Championship team. On Thursday, August 31, the Comets travel to DeWitt for a week two regular season matchup.

Week 2 - Kevin Bartz, Edwardsburg

Detroit, MI—The Detroit Lions have named Kevin Bartz of Edwardsburg High School the week two recipient of the 2017 Farm Bureau Insurance of Michigan High School Football Coach of the Week Program. Bartz's Edwardsburg Eddies defeated Otsego 72-0 during week two of the 2017 high school football season.

Bartz is in his 23rd season as head coach at Edwardsburg and has led the Eddies to the playoffs the last seven seasons (11 seasons overall), while reaching the state semi-finals in 2010, 2014 and 2016. His career record is 149-72 (67.4%). On Friday, September 8, the Eddies travel to Paw Paw to take on the 2-0 Redskins in a Wolverine Conference battle.

In terms of player health and safety, all Edwardsburg student-athletes are provided a baseline concussion test at the beginning of their sports year to measure reaction time, memory capacity, speed of mental processing, and functioning of the brain. These baseline tests are compared to post-injury tests and can provide extensive information about an athlete's history with concussions.

Week 3 - Tim Wooer, Traverse City West

Detroit, MI — The Detroit Lions have named Tim Wooer of Traverse City West High School the week three recipient of the 2017 Farm Bureau Insurance of Michigan High School Football Coach of the Week Program. Wooer's Traverse City West Titans defeated crosstown rival Traverse City Central 29-27 in the 6th annual TC Patriot game, a game that honors and pays tribute to those active military, military veterans and 1st responders that serve our country and communities.

Wooer is in his 26th season coaching; 23rd as a head coach. He was the head coach of Farwell for four seasons (1995-98), Kingsley for nine seasons (1999-07) and is currently in his 10th season as West's head coach. During his career, Wooer has led his teams to 17 state playoff appearances (6 with TC West), having won the state championship with Kingsley in 2005. His career record is 139-84 (62.3%). On Friday, September 15, the Titans host the 2-1 Petoskey Northmen in a Big North Conference battle.

Player health and safety is a key part of Traverse City. West's football program. Student-athletes are evaluated using several baseline concussion screening tests, including ImPACT, through a partnership with Munson Health System. ImPACT is a computerized neurocognitive assessment tool designed to help licensed healthcare providers evaluate and manage a suspected concussion. Studentathletes diagnosed with a concussion are taken through a comprehensive evidence-based return-toplay protocol utilizing the most relevant and up-to-date research. The Traverse City West Athletic department also uses an online software tool called "Sportsware" to share information about a student-athlete's rehabilitation and injury management plan with their parents.

Week 4 - Tony Kimbrough, East Kentwood

Detroit, MI—The Detroit Lions have named Tony Kimbrough of East Kentwood High School the week four recipient of the 2017 Farm Bureau Insurance of Michigan High School Football Coach of the Week Program. Kimbrough's East Kentwood Falcons defeated Grand Rapids Forest Hills Northern 46-32 to run their record to 4-0 on the season.

Kimbrough has coached for 21 seasons and is currently in his 4th season as a head coach at East Kentwood. He was an assistant at East Kentwood for four seasons, Grand Rapids Community College for three seasons, and Western Michigan University for two seasons, in addition to coaching in the Arena Football League for eight seasons. The Falcons have made two state playoff

Week 5 - Jason Mensing, Ottawa Lake

Detroit, MI—The Detroit Lions have named Jason Mensing of Ottawa Lake Whiteford High School the week five recipient of the 2017 Farm Bureau Insurance of Michigan High School Football Coach of the Week Program. Mensing's Bobcats defeated Adrian Madison 670 to run their record to 5-0 on the season.

Mensing has coached for 18 seasons, 15 as a head coach. He was an assistant coach for one year each at Adrian College, Siena Heights University and Addison High School. His head coaching stints included 1 year at Addison, 1 year at Grayling, 3 years at Owosso, 4 years at Tecumseh and he is currently in his 6th season at Ottawa Lake Whiteford. The Bobcats have made the state playoffs in each of his five seasons. Two seasons ago, the Bobcats reached the state semifinals for the first time in school history and last season finished as the Division 8 runner up to state champion Muskegon Catholic Central. appearances under Kimbrough, advancing to the Division 1 semifinals in 2014 where they lost to eventual champion Clarkston. His career record is 25-11 (69.4%). On Friday, September 22, the Falcons host the 3-1 Grandville Bulldogs in an Ottawa-Kent Conference Red Division battle.

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In terms of player health and safety, the Falcons coaching staff focuses on form and roll tackling drills throughout their tackling circuit, resulting in minimal inpractice contact. The team also utilizes specialized football equipment that stresses proper tackling technique without tackling others. These procedures, in addition to a strength training emphasis on development of a student-athlete's neck muscles, are believed to help reduce concussion and injury risk.

Mensing's career record is 90-62 while being 52-13 (80%) at Ottawa Lake Whiteford. On Friday, September 29, the Bobcats travel to Morenci to take on the 3-2 Bulldogs in a Tri-County Conference clash.

In terms of player health and safety, Mensing gathers plenty of information to help educate his coaches and players. Providing baseline concussion testing for all Ottawa Lake Whiteford student-athletes, teaching a better and safer way to block and tackle, and reducing physical contact in practice throughout the course of the season are some of the critical player health and safety points of emphasis employed by Mensing and the Ottawa Lake Whiteford Athletic Department.
