C. At the Fall meeting, come prepared with Coach of the Year responsibilities completed.

1. Contact any coach from your region receiving a Regional Coach of the Year award.

2. Make sure each honored coach is in attendance at the January clinic for his presentation.

D. Prior to January elections, if running for re-election, be sure your name has been properly placed on the
- ballot. If not seeking re-election, encourage at least two coaches from your region to run.
- E. Attend the MHSFCA Winners Circle Clinic and be prepared to assume at least one Clinic responsibility. Bring a gift for a door prize.
- IV. Serve as an active member of whatever committee you were appointed to by the President.
- V. Report to your region all urgent business transacted or discussed as soon as possible. Keep a record of all expenses incurred in such cases of necessary communication and submit to the Executive Director for reimbursement.
- VI. Be ethical in all your football relationships so as to be a model to the coaches in your region.

The MHSFCA's 42nd Annual Football Clinic

This year marks our 42nd annual clinic focused on presenting the best, most current and informational speakers from within our state and beyond. Our Associations' Clinic Committee has striven to bring speakers from every variety of football including 11 Man, 8 Man and Youth football. Speaker's backgrounds include every level from youth to professional promising almost every style of offense, defense and special teams. This year, we have moved the clinic to Lansing, where 90% of our state's population is within a 90 minute drive. All attendees should be able to experience a variety of presentations that will enhance their programs, coaching skills and playbook collection.

New to the clinic this year: Saturday's sessions will be extended and will be totally dedicated to Youth Football. The Saturday Youth program has been developed in partnership with the Michigan Youth Athletic Association (MYAA) to provide our state's Youth coaches exposure to the best practices of our profession.

An exciting - and important - portion of our clinic will focus on player safety, focusing specifically on concussions. As a feature of the 2014 clinic, we will have a panel of experts from Sparrow Hospital and C.S. Mott Children's Hospital. The panel will present research findings and answer coaches' questions to improve our ability to safeguard our astudent-athletes.

If you don’t enjoy all that good fortune, you can still do a first class job of helping your athletes reach their post high school football goals – attend a MHSFCA Recruiting Night!

In the best year yet for the MHSFCA sponsored Recruiting Nights:

- 130 Michigan High School Football Coaches (20% of the 620 in the state that play football) took advantage of one or more of the eight events across the state.
- Well over 400 student-athletes/potential college football players and their parents met with college and university coaches from six states representing over 30 different institutions. *See list of college participants below.

What did they do? They spent a couple late afternoon hours (5:00-7:00 pm) in the cafeteria of one of the host schools (Hartford, Walled Lake Western, Leslie, Carman Ainsworth, Lowell, Troy, Grayling) exchanging athletes’ transcripts, stats and video with several (minimum 12/maximum 24) college and university coaches. Starting at about 6:30 a total (for the eight “Nights”) of over 400 student athletes, several with their parents, spent another hour and more meeting with college and university

2013 Football Task Force Practice Proposal

From MHSAA

During 2013, a Football Task Force has focused on the following topics:

1. Review practice policies to improve acclimatization of players and reduce head trauma.
2. Review competition rules to reduce head trauma and the frequency of the sport's most injurious game situations.
3. Develop promotions that extol the value of football to students, schools and communities and the safety record of school-based football.

The promotional efforts have begun to be rolled out; game rule modifications are being investigated; and the following proposals for changing football practice policies have been prepared:

1. During the first week of practice of the season, only helmets are allowed the first two days, only shoulder pads may be added on the third and fourth days, and full pads may not be worn until the fifth day of team practice.
2. Before the first regular season game, schools may not schedule more than one "collision" practice in a day.
 - A "collision" practice is one in which there is live, game-speed, player-vs-player contact in pads (not walk-throughs) involving any number of players. This includes practices with scrimmages, drills and simulations where action is live, game-speed, player-vs-player.
 - If any part of a drill or scrimmage involves live game-speed player-vs-player contact in pads, it is a collision practice even if players do not execute full tackles at a competitive pace that takes players to the ground.
 - During any additional practice sessions that day, players may wear helmets and other pads (neither is mandatory). Blocking and tackling technique may be taught and practiced. However, full-speed contact is limited to player-vs: pads, shields, sleds or dummies.
3. After the first regular season game, teams may conduct no more than two collision practice days in any week, Monday through Sunday. During other days of practice, players may wear helmets and other protective pads (neither is mandatory). Blocking and tackling technique may be taught and practiced. However, full-speed contact is limited to player-vs: pads, shields, sleds or dummies.
4. No single practice may exceed three hours, and the total practice time for days with multiple practice sessions may not exceed five hours.
 - Warm-up, stretching, speed and agility drills and cool down are all considered part of practice. Neither strength/weight training activities nor video/classroom sessions are considered practice for the purposes of the three- or five-hour limits.

Note: It is the intent of the Task Force to finalize its consensus regarding these matters previewed by the Repre-

sentative Council Dec. 6, 2013, and then reviewed by the Michigan High School Football Coaches Association, the MHSAA Football Committee and at the MHSAA League Leadership meet-ing prior to Representative Council action in March 2014.

Football Practice Proposal Q & As

1. Q Would the proposals apply at both the high school and junior high/middle school levels?
A Yes.
2. Q Is the purpose of the proposals to improve student-athlete acclimatization or reduce head trauma?
A Both.
3. Q What is the Task Force position on "girdle pads" during the first week of practice?
A Girdle pads may be worn under or in place of shorts during the first four days of acclimatization practice that precede the first day in full pads.
4. Q Does the three-hour limit on single practices and the five-hour limit for multiple practices on the same day apply only to football?
A Yes. The Task Force recommends that the limits be added as soon as possible to the MHSAA "Model Policy for Managing Heat & Humidity" and apply to all sports.
5. Q How much time is required between sessions on days with multiple practices?
A Because practice venues differ greatly and some may raise questions re-garding supervision and the possibility of injury risks as great off the field as on, the Task Force declined to set a maximum and minimum length of rest periods. However, one hour between practices when there is no physical activity is the minimum recommendation. Classroom sessions would be allowed during the period of physical rest. To be clear, break time is not included in the five-hour limit.
6. Q Can a team have different collision days for different players?
A If varsity and sub-varsity squads practice separately, their collision days may be different days. However, if the squads practice together, then their collision days must be the same.

Playoff Proposal to be Resubmitted

The MHSFCA will bring the same playoff points proposal (adding strength of schedule bonuses) that we took to the MHSAA Football Rules Committee last February to that group again in February 2014. The proposal will not include a requirement for an arbitrary number of wins, which was added last February by the MHSAA.

Understanding the new playoff proposal:

- Divisions will be predetermined and set before the season. Eight equally distributed divisions of 11 player football division eligible schools.
- There will be NO win guarantee to get in.
- There are two categories to earn playoff points
 1. Win Points
 2. Points earned based upon the size of your opponent.
- Broken in 8 divisions as opposed to 4 classes
- Strength of Schedule Points
 - * Earn points for wins your opponent has
 - * A set number of points if you beat them
 - * A set number of points if you lose to themThese numbers are far closer than the current system
- Top 32 teams from each division will make the playoffs
- Districts will be set up after the season and the 32 teams are selected.

 - Why not choose to be the very best you can be everyday?
And. . .
 - What sacrifices do you need to make to be the best?
Do you quit when you get tired?
In football everyone has a “quit” down. You can only go 100% for so many plays before you take a down off. Compete in everything you do and find a way to win when you are tired.

Officials Ratings - The Process Highlights

As each fall season winds down, there are a number of details that coaches must complete to wrap up their season. One task that can often seem like a real chore is rating each official that worked for your school during the season. While some may see this duty as a pain in the neck, this process is critical when it comes time for officials to be assigned during the MHSAA Football tournament.

Let’s start first with the regulation itself. MHSAA Handbook, Regulation II, Section 7 (B) requires schools to rate officials who officiate contests involving their teams in sports for which ratings are maintained. Ratings must be submitted online at MHSAA.com. The following guidelines and definitions are provided to assist member school athletic directors and coaches in rating officials.

Varsity Rating Definitions

- “1” Excellent — Very good, first class, surpasses all others. Typically, the quality of performance required to officiate tournament contests in the advanced rounds.
- “2” Above Average — Better than the mean, high quality, better than the accepted level of performance. Typically, the quality of performance required to officiate mid and lower level tournament contests.
- “3” Satisfactory — Adequate, average, a solid performance. Typically, the quality of performance required to officiate seasonal and lower level tournament contests.
- “4” Below Average — Deficient, lacking the skills and/or knowledge to earn a higher rating. Typically, an official who would benefit from training and education.
- “5” Unsatisfactory — Not desirable, definite improvement required. Typically, a performance that lacks accepted mechanics, has limited knowledge of the rules, demonstrates weak people skills. Requires written narrative from the school that is shared with the official to facilitate a professional exchange of information for improvement.

What Information Does the Official Receive?

Following each season, the MHSAA tabulates the rating average for each official. An official can see how many ratings in each category has been submitted (the number of 1 ratings, 2 ratings, etc) along with a summary of any areas for improvement submitted by schools. When a school submits a rating of 1-4, those ratings remain completely anonymous and confidential. In other words, officials can see a list of schools in alphabetical order that submitted a rating during that season, but they are not told what school submitted which particular rating. The only time the information provided by a school via the rating process is shared with the official is when a “5” rating is submitted.

For tournament selection purposes, officials and crews

are considered for tournament assignments based on their overall rating average over the past three seasons. This allows the selection committee to get an idea of the level of work from an official or crew over a significant period of time, not just a few games from the previous year.

Tips for Coaches

When a coach sits down to begin the process, we suggest that each official should start out with a “2” rating as the game begins. His or her work during the game could either move that rating up (excellent hustle, people skills or critical correct call) or down (lack of hustle, poor people skills, inconsistent judgment, etc.). If the game has no real issues of any kind, the official most likely deserves to stay at the “2” rating level where he/she started. When analyzing all football ratings currently submitted, this is the most often given rating by coaches.

Another key reminder is to NOT rate officials immediately following the event. Allow time to “cool down” after the game, and allow other games to be played before rating those officials so you have a means of comparison before submitting those ratings. Video review can often bring objectivity in assessing the true performance of the officials.

Ratings are the starting point for all tournament officiating selection committees; ratings submitted by schools are critically important for officials when deciding who does, and who does not, receive officiating invitations for MHSAA tournament events. Ratings need to objectively submitted by schools after stepping back and considering where the official being rated “fits” when being compared with all other officials observed in that sport.

Know that should a coach threaten an official with

the rating process or a poor rating during a game or contest, that coach should expect to be penalized immediately. Threats of this nature, even in the heat of the battle, are unacceptable and inappropriate. Ratings should be an exchange between two professionals; not a means of vindictiveness to attempt to get back at someone when disagreements appear. It is also important that coaches don’t rate an official based on one call or game situation. A rating should be submitted for each official based on his or her body of work for the entire contest. If one crew member has had a poor game in your opinion, rate that official accordingly but do not punish other crew members if they had nothing to do with those negative situations.

I hope this information has provided some of the reasons why we have rating program along with some tips and advice for next year’s rating process. When an official’s
