 - D. Prior to January elections, if running for re-election,

be sure your name has been properly placed on the ballot. If not seeking re-election, encourage at least two coaches from your region to run.

- E. Attend the MHSFCA Winners Circle Clinic and be prepared to assume at least one Clinic responsibility. Bring a gift for a door prize.
- IV. Serve as an active member of whatever committee you were appointed to by the President.
- Report to your region all urgent business transacted or discussed as soon as possible. Keep a record of all expenses incurred in such cases of necessary communication and submit to the Executive Director for reimbursement.
- Be ethical in all your football relationships so as to be a model to the coaches in your region.



Defensive Back Tackling Progression from Cover Three

ach Day defensive backs in our program will form tackle. We will practice perfect form fits each day. These three basic fits will be done in succession during camps and two-a-days. During the season will do two of the \blacksquare three form tackles on Monday, Tuesday, and Wednesday. As the season goes on our individual time gets less.

Each player will be paired with another player. The tackler will stand with his right foot splitting the inseam of his partner to the tackler's left. The tackler will be 6 to 8 inches from his partner. The tackler will assume a football position (flex in the knees and hips with hands at his sides) then when the coach says "hit" he will step with his right foot while sinking his hips and loading his arms back then he will drive his right shoulder and chest up through his partners chest. The tackler's head will be up and he will hit on the rise. The path of the arms is very important. The hands should act as clubs and be thrown up through the partner then there should be a wrap. The tackler's left foot will follow after contact. Coaches will then check for the head placement (the tackler should end up chest to chest with the offensive player with his head up and slightly left of center), feet are in a balanced position so they won't lose the tackle, and finally the wrap by the tackler. We have our players hold this position to check on the fit. We will do multiple reps then switch to a Left-Foot Left-Shoulder tackle. Most players keep their eyes open and head up better when doing this drill without helmets. We teach all DBs in our program how to do this drill without helmets first.

2-step tackling: Right-Foot Right-Shoulder tackle. Everything is the same as above except for two things. One the distance the tackler is from his partner. The tackler should move 6 to 8 inches farther back than he was for the 1-step tackle. Two we take two steps before striking. So, if it's a Right-Shoulder tackle, then the tackler will step first with his Left Foot then Right Foot before striking. In order to hit on the rise, players must keep their feet under their bodies. Younger players want to take long strides when doing this drill. They will lunge. We don't want that. The problem is that they can't hit on the rise and their head goes down. Instead there should be two quick power steps then a strike on the rise.

Form Fit: Next is our form fit. Most people do this drill. We start with our players 3 yards from the ball carrier. The ball carrier is given a direction. Everyone knows which way they are going. The tacklers buzz their feet then on "hit" they will precede down hill and make a tackle in a perfect form fit. We tell them if they are going to their left then it will be a Right-Foot Right-Shoulder and if they are going to their right it will be a Left-Foot Left-Shoulder tackle.

Cornerbacks: *Break down and tackle.* (3 Cones and yard lines) CB's will align 7 yards off the WR. There will be a cone where the WR lines up. Set two cones up 5 yards away from the WR. The cones should be 5 yards apart. The coach will say "hit" the CB will backpedal. On the second "hit" the CB will sprint to where the two cones are. The CB will come to balance/break

1 step tackling: Right-Foot Right-Shoulder tackle. down in a football position when the coach says "go" the WR will run towards one of those cones. The coaching point here is to tell the CB's where their help is so they force the WR to their help. (For example a Left CB will force the WR to the defense's Right) The CB needs to be patient. Usually this won't be a big hit. As the season goes on the cadences from the coach gets faster and the WR's can make one move, but they must stay between the cones. We may also widen the cones so the WR has more room. We are really looking at their feet when they are doing this drill. At the minimum the CB needs to force the WR back to the defense. We cannot miss. No one should end up on the ground.

> **Free Safety:** *Free Safety Tackling (5 Cones and yard lines)* FS will align 10 yard off the LOS and on the ball. Put a cone where the FS aligns and where the ball is located. Also, put a cone 5 yards behind where the QB would stand. The RB will run with a shield or ball in a toss sweep direction. Next we'll place two cones 5 yards apart on the LOS about 10 yards from the ball placement. The FS knows the direction of the ball carrier. We will say the ball carrier is going to the defens's left. When the FS hears "hit" he will backpedal. He needs to get at least two steps in then the coach will say "go." On "go" the RB runs his sweep and the FS will fill on a 45 degree angle inside out. The FS will be careful not to over pursue. He will stay on the inside hip of the RB. When the FS is 5 yards from the two cones he will come to balance/breakdown. He will close the distance to the RB. The FS needs force the RB to his help which is to the outside. We cannot allow the RB to cutback against the FS. The FS will then make a Right-Foot Right-Shoulder tackle. The key to this drill is for the FS to be patient and not over pursue.

Cornerbacks and Safeties: Leverage Tackling

From a Cover 3 Alignment the CB's and FS on one side of the field will work together to leverage the RB back to the defense. The CB will leverage the RB back to the FS and the FS will leverage the RB back to the CB. The coach will simulate a toss to a TB at 7 yards. The TB will run a toss to the predetermined side. The RB will be carrying a hand shield. The TB has three options: split the CB/FS, cutback on the FS, or beat the CB up the sideline. The DB's will take their initial backpedal and shuffle then react and create a perfect fit on the RB. The RB should never end up on the ground. The purpose of this drill is footwork on tackling, using the defens's leverage, and stopping a big play. This has been a great drill for us. This also could be done from cover 2 and quarters coverage.

Acknowledgements: These drills came from watching others coach, talking to other coaches, and watching film. Coach Pat Dignan really helped me understand how to best tackle. Also, Dennis Allen and Tony Oden who were with the Saints helped me understand leverage tackling. They were really helpful.

Recruiting

The Recruiting Process:

College coaches will continue to acquire prospect information from high school coaches and discount information from commercial recruiting services. These relationships are based on a trust built over time. Every college coach wants a truthful relationship with the high school coach. Inflated numbers, dishonest evaluations can hurt the high school coach's future recruits.

The role of the high school coach:

- 1. Supply viewable game tapes, in winter of junior year for most D1, middle to end of season for seniors.
- 2. Provide accurate student bio information and a copy of the high school transcript.
- 3. Complete the NCAA approved recruiting services forms so the prospects are listed in the publication.
- 4. Attend the MHSFCA December recruiting fairs. A number of colleges will only recruit our state at these fairs.

The role of the Student-Athlete:

- 1. Attend College Camps: This is where most college scholarships are awarded. Attend and perform at the different college camps in front of college coaches. College coaches want information they can trust. Performing on a college campus and against other prospects can reinforce a prospect's evaluation. All camp dates are on every web site.
- 2. Game Tapes: College coaches evaluate student athletes based on real game tape footage. Make sure the college coaches have your game tape at the appropriate time (December of Junior year for D1). If they feel you are a real prospect, they will connect with you or your coach (given NCAA restrictions). The higher the division desired, the earlier the tapes are needed. For example, some D1 offers could be based on sophomore tape and most are based on junior game tape.

Coaches, Student Athletes and Parents:

1. Understand the NCAA and NAIAA cademic Eligibility rules before the student athlete's ninth grade year begins. The NCAA continues to add more restrictions to their eligibility

process. The Class of 2013 will now need 16 core classes to qualify as a D2 athlete. The Class of 2015 will need a 2.3 GPA to qualify as a D1 athlete. Academic eligibility begins with the first semester report card in the 9th grade. All students and parents need to calculate the students NCAA CORE GPA every semester beginning with the 9th grade.

- 2. The overall GRADE POINT AVERAGE (GPA) is the most important number in the recruiting process. The higher the GPA above a 3.0, the more athletic opportunities are available. The most important high school report card is the first semester of the student athletes ninth grade.
- 3. Academic Scholarships are Guaranteed: College athletic scholarships are limited and in high demand. Academic scholarships are available at all colleges and universities. All students can earn academic scholarships but athletic offers are determined by the evaluation of college coaches. Again, the most important report card is high school is the first semester of the 9th grade year.

Football officials need to have many of the same traits when it comes to the rules as they need to know those rules inside and out while being able to apply them quickly and clearly. Many times this needs to be done during highly intense and emotional moments for the coaches, players and fans involved.

Let's imagine it's the off-season and you are looking to make some big money on a game show. You have won all of the preliminary rounds, and you have gotten on the actual show! In the Double Jeopardy round, there is one final category left titled "HS Football Officiating". There are 10 questions, and much like the game show, the questions get harder as the dollar amounts increase. Keep track of your score and let's see how well you are able to do. Simply try and answer the questions correctly; we won't worry if you forget to phrase your response in the form of a question. Good luck!

The Questions

\$100

Defender B7 tackles receiver A13 while a pass is in the air. As the ball lands, it is clear that A13 had no chance whatsoever, even without contact, to the catch the ball. The correct ruling b. It is always a foul when the offense breaks the huddle with

- a. Pick up the flag no foul since the pass was uncatchable.
- b. Defensive pass interference on B7-15 yard penalty, automatic first down.

On an extra point attempt, the defense forces a fumble at the two-yard line and scoops the ball up and begins a 98-yard sprint with open field in front of them.

- Great play by the defense. If they score, it counts for 2 points for the defense.
- b. Good play by the defense with no reward. The ball becomes dead as soon as the defense gained possession of the ball. Let's head to midfield for the kickoff.

There are only four defensive fouls that also include an automatic first down for the offense. What are those four fouls?

Team A lines up for a 42-yard field goal (ball is being snapped from the 25 yard line and is placed down at the 32) attempt into a strong wind. The ball is kicked but is hooked left and will come up far short of the goal posts. The kick rolls out bounds at the 4-yard line. Where will Team B next put the ball into play after the missed field goal attempt?

- a. It is a touchback. 1st and 10 at the 20.
- b. Previous spot. 1st and 10 at the 25.
- d. Spot where the kick ended. 1st and 10 at the 4.

\$900

Team A kicks off from their own 40 yard line and kicks the ball high into the air 15 yards down the field. At the 45 yard line, with no Team B return team player anywhere near the ball, #33 from Team A catches the kick in the air (ball has never touched the ground) and takes off toward his goal line.

- a. Great play by #33. The ball remains live and he can advance.
- b. Good play by #33. While he cannot advance a kick, it will be Team A's ball at the 45.
- c. Bad play by #33. He has just committed a foul for Kick Catch Interference. Team B may either take the ball at the spot of the foul, or have a 15-yard penalty enforced from c. the 40 and we re-kick.

\$1,000

Your star punter returner A4 retreats inside the 5-yard line to catch a deep punt on a rainy October night. He catches the ball over his shoulder at the 3-yard line, and his momentum takes him back into his end zone. He still has room to run, and tries to "plant & go" but slips and falls down while in possession of the ball in your own end zone. What has your star punt returner just done?

- a. Given your opponent 2 points. This is a safety.
- b. Given your team bad field position. Your ball, 1st and 10 at the 3-yard line.
- Given your team a touchback. Your ball, 1st and 10 at the 20-yard line.

The Answers & Comments

\$100

Answer: B - No. While a coach or captain can request a measurement, it is the sole judgment of the referee whether or not to measure for a first down.

\$200

Answer: B - Defensive pass interference on B7 - 15 yard penalty, automatic first down. Under NF (high school) rules, there is no such thing as an "uncatchable pass" that would negate pass interference.

\$300

Answer: B - Good play by the defense with no reward. The ball becomes dead as soon as the defense gained possession of the ball. Let's head to midfield for the kickoff. Remember that once the defense gains possession on a PAT, the try is over and the ball is dead.

\$400

Answer: A - Do nothing. The ball became dead as soon as a kick breaks the plane of the goal line. 1st and 10 from the 20. Under NF rules, all kicks become dead once the ball has broken the plane of the goal line as long as the status of the ball is still a kick.

\$500

Answer: A - The series is over; the other team now goes on offense. Unlike the college game, the ball becomes dead in overtime once the defense gains possession of the ball on a fumble or interception.

\$600

Answer: E - None of these are true statements under NF rules. The following are all FASLE statements on Friday night but would be true during a game played using NCAA rules. (1) Defensive holding is always a 5-yard penalty and an automatic first down. 2) It is always a foul when the offense breaks the huddle with 12 players. 3) A personal foul against the defense always results in an automatic first down for the offense. Note that two personal fouls never result in a player being ejected at any level.

\$700

- 1) Defensive Pass Interference
- 2) Roughing the Kicker or Holder
- 3) Roughing the Passer
- 4) Roughing the Snapper (only when in a scrimmage kick formation)

\$800

Answer: D-Spot where the kick ended. 1st and 10 at the 4. Under NF rules, we treat all scrimmage kicks (punts and field goal attempts) exactly the same way. When one of these scrimmage kicks goes out bounds that is the spot where Team B takes over.

\$900

Answer: C - Bad play by #33. He has just committed a foul for Kick Catch Interference. Team B may either take the ball at the spot of the foul, or have a 15-yard penalty enforced from the 40 and we re-kick. On a free kick (kickoff), the kicking team must either allow the ball to touch the ground and travel 10 yards to recover the ball or it must be touched by a member of the return team. This pooch-style kick caught in the air is legal under NCAA and NFL rules, but is a foul under NF rules.

\$1,000

Answer: B - Given your team bad field position. Your ball, 1st and 10 at the 3-yard line. This is the momentum rule exception which states that if a member of the defensive or return team gains possession of the ball on a fumble, interception or kick inside their 5-yard line and that momentum takes that player back into the end zone, where their run then ends (falls down, gets tackled, etc), we bring the ball back out to the spot inside the 5-yard line where possession was gained.
