George Perles Guest Speaker for 8th Annual Hall of Fame Banquet

The list of outstanding coaches and speakers who have addressed the Hall of Fame will grow April 7th, 1990 with the addition of George Perles, the highly successful coach of the Michigan State University, Hula Bowl-bound Spartans. Previous Hall of Fame Speakers have included such football greats as Woody Hayes, Ara Parseghian, Duffy Daugherty, Don Canham, Alex Agase and Bo Schembechler. To date 199 of Michigan's finest coaches have been inducted into the MHSFCA Hall of Fame.

Head Coach George Perles has returned Michigan State football to a position of power in the Big Ten. Coach Perles

has been the recipient of many national coaching awards. He was named the head coach of the East team for the 1987 East-West Shrine Game and the 1989 Japan Bowl. Under Perles State has appeared in the 84 Cherry Bowl, the 85 All-American Bowl, the 88 Rose Bowl, and the 89 Gator Bowl.

George Perles has coached successfully on all levels; high school, professional, and collegiate, and has been a real advocate of Michigan High School football. Year in and year out his football roster contains the names of many Michigan high school football players. George has also been instrumental in helping our organization to establish our annual All Star football game held on the MSU campus every year. We look forward to having George Perles as our Hall of Fame speaker.

Prevention — is the Key to Halting Drug Abuse

It is no secret that drug abuse continues to be at an all time high in our country. The reality is, despite the gradual decline in the daily use of Marijuana, the United States still has the highest rate of illicit drug use among young people of any other industrialized nation in the world.

There are many strategies for waging the war on drug abuse. Some agencies concentrate on treatment and rehabilitation, others focus on stopping drugs at the borders or enforcing penalties.

These approaches are helpful and important components of an overall drug prevention strategy, but it is naive to think that these actions alone will solve the problem.

Instead, what is called for is a preventative, rather than a reactive approach. We need to understand the reasons kids turn to drugs — whether it is peer pressure, experimentation, or just looking for fun — and then concentrate on reducing the number of kids who seek answers through drugs. We can do this only through a

realistic strategy of prevention and education.

As coaches and educators, it is not enough to tell our young people to "just say no." We need to teach them skills that will make them feel confident and competent, so they know why they are saying no.

Selecting a drug prevention curriculum that is effective, comprehensive, and appropriate is an important task that requires careful planning. Essential considerations are offered by the U.S. Department of Education

Selecting a drug prevention curriculum that is effective, comprehensive, and appropriate is an important task that requires careful planning.

1. Determine the nature and extent of the drug problem in your area.

Research suggests that techniques that are effective for one type of drug may be less effective or even ineffective for other types. Consider how your course of action will be affected by the drugs used in your community and the severity of the problem.

2. Establish regular lines of communication among all parties who will play a role in the drug prevention program.

Parents, teachers and other school staff, administrative and supervisory personnel, community leaders, law enforcement officials, health professionals, and district and state officers are all important to the success of a comprehensive prevention program.

3. Obtain the commitment of all to support a firm no-use policy.

There can be no responsible use of illegal substances. School policies should clearly state that alcohol and other drug use by students will not be tolerated. Penalties for violations should be enforced consistently and fairly.

4. Establish a means of regularly monitoring the extent and character of tobacco, alcohol and other drug use, possession, and distribution in your district.

Law enforcement officials can be especially helpful in assessing patterns of possession and distribution.

5. Develop a clear, concise policy against drug use in your school.

This policy should affirm a clear no-use philosophy establish definite sanctions, set forth clear procedures for fair and firm enforcement, and encourage self-referral for help.

6. Communicate the school's anti-drug policy to parents, students, staff, and all others concerned.

Obtain formal assurance that they understand the policy, including its enforcement provisions, and ensure the school personnel are aware of their roles and responsibilities under the policy.

7. Plan your comprehensive school-based drug prevention program.

Curriculum is only one element in a comprehensive program. Planners need to assess how the curriculum component should interact with the rest of the plan.

8. Commit to having a curriculum that is academically sound.

The curriculum should convey accurate information using the best techniques. In addition, the drug prevention material should be graded in the same manner as other subjects and should be coordinated with other disciplines at each grade level.

9. Analyze your need, resources, and capabilities.

Determine whether it is best to design your own curriculum, or apply your criteria to selecting or adapting a commercially available package.

In order to be considered for one of the scholarships the head football coach of the student's school must be a member of the MHSFCA. Scholarships are chosen by —

- Academic performance
- ACT scores
- Demonstrated service to school, community and church
- Evidence of leadership ability

All applications for the 1990 scholarships must be submitted to the MHSFCA Scholarship Committee before March 1, 1990. Coaches, do your part to encourage your players and support staff (male and female) to apply for these scholarships.

1989 Assistant Coach of The Year Awards

The first two things a head coach will note about a solid assistant coach is that he is loyal and dedicated. Too many fans do not realize that good head coaches are only as good as their assistants.

Assistant coaches have to take a second fiddle to the head coach. The head coach knows he has to find assistant coaches who can teach and communicate with the players. The head coach also knows the assistant must be held in high regard by the players if the team is to be successful.

Too many times the assistant is overlooked in the performance of his duties.

The Assistant Coach of The Year Award is designed to give the assistant coach the recognition he deserves.

In addition to the award for varsity, junior varsity, and freshman or junior high assistant of the year awards an award has been approved for more experienced coaches. This award is to be given to assistants who have been head coaches, college coaches, or coaches who have "retired," but maintain a great love for the game. Although these assistants may never get enough years to receive the regular assistant awards, their contributions should not go unno-

ticed. This special award will be given when it is deemed appropriate, and may not be given each year.

In order to win an Assistant Coach of the Year Award both the assistant and his head coach must be members of the MHSFCA. (All head coaches should check to make sure their nominated assistants are members. Every year assistant coach nominees are disqualified because they aren't members!) The assistant must also have at least 10 years coaching as an assistant. The most important criterion for consideration is the number of years the assistant has been a member of your staff. The assistant who has been coaching for 18 or 19 years at the same school may have a better chance for selection than one who has the same number of years in coaching, but only 8 or 9 years at the nominating school. (The guy who has had other opportunities, but remains at one school for a long period of time has to be given a long look.) Loyalty to one program is a big factor. A coach nearing retirement will also be given special consideration.

Each of the Assistant Coach Awards carry a great deal of prestige within the MHSFCA. They are recognition for great dedication and loyalty.

1989 Academic MHSFCA All State Team

The MHSFCA, through its Scholarship Committee, has chosen its third **Academic All State Football Team**. The following criteria were applied to the 110 nominees:

1. The nominee's coach must be a member of the MHSFCA.
2. The player must be a senior in the year he applies.
3. The player must be a "starter" during his senior year.
4. The player must have earned a 3.5 overall grade point average.
5. The player must have scored 22 or higher on the A.C.T. or equivalent S.A.T

***Each school can nominate one (1) player!**

Of the top twenty-four scholar athletes, thirteen were ranked 1st in their class, two were ranked 2d, three were 3d. Fourteen of the top twenty-four had maintained a 4.0 grade point average—or better. The next ten had GPA's of 3.9-3.99.

The highest score on the ACT by the top twenty-four was a 34. Two of the players had a 33, two had a 32, six had 31, eight had 30, and five had 29.
