Walt Braun Awarded '92 Crowley Award at MHSFCA Clinic Banquet

The Jim Crowley Award is the most prestigious award given by the Michigan High School Football Coaches Association and is in honor of the late Jim Crowley, the long-time coach at Jackson St. John High School and Jackson Lumen Christi High School, who was tragically killed in 1980, just two short months after winning his second state football title.

Webster defines the word courageous as - having the mental strength to venture, persevere, and withstand danger, fear or extreme difficulty with firmness of mind and will in a determination to achieve one's goal. This definition certainly describes this year's recipient of the Jim Crowley Award.

Walt Braun graduated from Romeo High School in 1952. He received his B.S. in education from Central Michigan University in 1956 and a Master of Arts in physical education and athletic administration from Central in 1959. Walt got his first football coaching job at Brown City

High School right out of college in 1956, becoming one of - if not the - youngest head football coach in Michigan. He had a rather inauspicious beginning as his team was winless in his first season, certainly not an indication of things to come. He coached four years at Brown City and five years at Oxford High School before taking the head coaching job at Marysville in 1965. Over the past twenty-seven years at Marysville Walt has coached: track, baseball, wrestling, and basketball (varsity and junior varsity), but it is in football

where he has made his mark, posting an eye popping 214-39-1 record. His victory total of 248-80-3 places him third in total wins among coaches in the history of Michigan High School Football. Coach Braun's teams have won three State Championships (two mythical), and four Regional Championships. They have made seven playoff appearances, had eight undefeated untied regular seasons and have won nineteen SCAL Championships. A Past President of the Michigan High School Football Coaches Association, Walt has been named a MHSFCA Regional Coach of the Year nine times, State Coach of the Year twice and is the only coach from Michigan ever to be named as the National High School Coach of the Year. Coach Braun was inducted into the MHSFCA Hall of Fame in

1984. He was the first recipient of the Detroit Free Press Sports Figure of the Year Award in 1986.

Walt received the MHSFCA's Jim Crowley Award, not only for his tremendous achievements as a football coach, but also for the inspiration he has given to his many players over the years and his willingness to share his knowledge of the game with fellow coaches.

Walt Braun has overcome tremendous physical difficulties in the past year and has courageously persevered to return to coach the 1991 Marysville Vikings. His courage and determination are examples of the "never quit" spirit that demonstrates what can happen when one has the courage to make it happen.

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Hall of Fame Speaker Gary Moeller

Gary Moeller will start his third season as the head coach at the University of Michigan in 1992 after leading the Wolverines to a 10-2 overall record and a sixth place finish in the national ranking in 1991.

Coach Moeller led the Wolverines to a perfect 8-0 mark in Big Ten play, the fourth straight conference championship for Michigan and second in two seasons for Moeller, and a trip to the Rose Bowl.

In his debut as Michigan's head coach in 1990, Moeller's Wolverines had a 9-3 overall record, a share of the Big Ten Championship and a 35-3 win over Mississippi in the 1991 Mazda Gator Bowl in Jacksonville, Florida.

A native of Lima, Ohio, Moeller starts his 21st season at the University of Michigan in 1992. Coach Moeller earned three varsity letters as a center and a linebacker at Ohio State (1960-62) under head coach Woody Hayes, while playing under OSU assistant coach Bo Schembechler. OSU was 21-5-1 in Moeller's three seasons and won the national championship in 1961. Moeller was captain in 1962.

Moeller joined Schembechler's staff at Miami of Ohio for the '67-'68 seasons and made the move to Michigan with Schembechler in 1969.

Gary was defensive end coach at Michigan until taking the defensive coordinator position in 1973. His defensive units led the nation in scoring defense in both 1974 and 1976.

Moeller was named head football coach at Illinois in 1976 and coached the Illini for three seasons (1977-79). He returned to Michigan as quarterback coach in 1980. In 1982 he was named defensive coordinator and assistant head coach. His '85 Michigan defensive unit once again led the nation in scoring defense.

In 1987 Moeller moved to the other side of the ball as he became offensive coordinator and assistant head coach.



After Bo underwent a second by-pass procedure, Moeller led the Wolverines to a 28-24 victory over Alabama in the 1988 Hall of Fame Bowl.

Gary and his wife, Ann, reside in Ann Arbor. They have three daughters, Susan (Mrs. Michael Weeks of Tyler, Texas), Amy (Mrs. James Hevel of Homewood, Illinois), and Molly (a junior at Indiana) and a son Andy (an assistant football coach at West Point).

Three Rivers' Field Goal/PAT Block

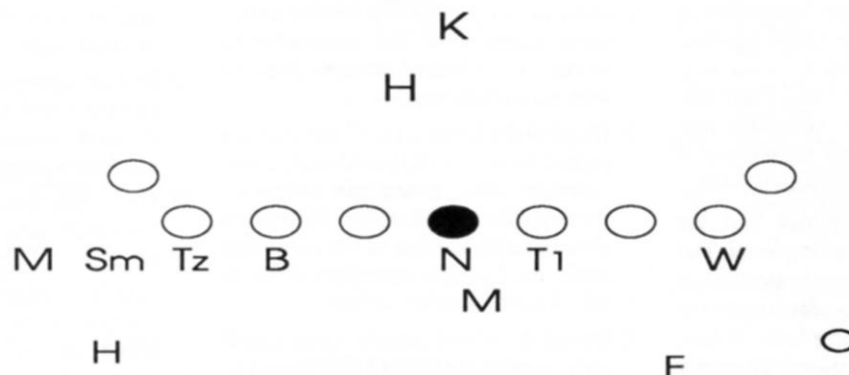

Rules for the Rush

1. Huddle on the offensive huddle. Be alert for "swinging gate" formation.
2. Ball on hash – always rush from the wide side of the field, unless unbalanced. On unbalanced formation move the defense over and rush from the short side.
3. Ball in the middle – right or left rush is dictated by your scouting report.
4. ALL rushing personnel key the football for initial charge.
5. Don't be offside.
6. Be alert for fake. Take your opponent out of the fake.
7. PAT rush – if the offense comes out in a regular formation and is going for two points, check the defense into our base package.
8. Know who has "spy" responsibilities. Holder is considered a runner. If the holder rolls, check throwback to kicker.
9. A blocked Field Goal/PAT can be the difference in a close game.
10. On a blocked field goal – scoop and score – DO NOT fall on the ball.

Improving the Student-Athlete Recruiting Process

The recruitment process of potential student-athletes represents a big business attitude in the eyes of colleges and universities:

The finances allocated to defray the numerous expenses involved in recruiting are enormous.

The time and effort extended by colleges and universities to locate, evaluate, recruit and sign student athletes represents a tremendous undertaking in manpower, organization and strategy in order to attract the best student athletes to a college or university.

Today, with a major emphasis on academic reform, it is imperative that we, as coaches, modify our game plan to provide proper guidelines and training to our athletes so they will be able to:

1. Meet the academic and testing criteria necessary to qualify for an athletic scholarship.
2. Improve and demonstrate their skills and competitiveness in relation to other student athletes in their city, state and nation.
3. Understand, complete and endure the recruiting process with minimum disruption in their daily routine and academic pursuits.



Strategies for Improving Student Athletes Academics and Test Scores

| <p>A. Coaches should begin immediately to <i>identify</i> the ninth grade student athletes who will be in your program. <i>Meet</i> with them and their parents to explain new academic and testing requirements necessary to qualify for an athletic scholarship.</p> <p>B. Request that counselors test the student athlete's reading level. The results will provide an indication of the student's chances for success in his classes. If reading level is low, arrange for the student to see a tutor and/or a reading specialist.</p> | <p>C. Monitor the student's course selections along with the counselor to ensure enrollment in core courses and core electives.</p> <p>D. Require students to turn in a progress report to you weekly so that you can monitor their academic progress, punctuality and behavior. The report should be handed in on the same day each week, at a specified time to reinforce a positive habit.</p> <p>E. Devise a reward system for students who are earning above a 2.6 GPA weekly.</p> <p>F. Encourage parents to insist that</p> | <p>students complete homework and/or read nightly.</p> <p>G. Encourage parents to attend all parent-teacher conferences (Call them if necessary!) to check on the student's progress.</p> <p>H. Have students begin taking SAT and ACT tests during the second semester of their sophomore year.</p> <p>I. Enroll students, who test low, in <i>study courses</i> to assist them in their efforts to pass tests. Make sure students take every test until they receive the minimum qualifying scores.</p> |
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Strategies for Improving Skills and Competitiveness

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| <p>A. Place emphasis on working with weights to improve strength, speed, quickness and endurance. Create a workable weight program to improve the student's chances for improved athletic performance. The program should be monitored so that athletes can see their improvement.</p> <p>B. Encourage students to work on their skill weaknesses as well as their strengths.</p> <p>C. Regularly test the athlete's skill levels to monitor their improvement. Record results and post them</p> | <p>to use as a device to motivate performance enhancement.</p> <p>D. Encourage and demand that athletes play other team sports to facilitate their skill improvement and competitiveness.</p> <p>E. Always post records, statistics and performances of athletes in the city, state and nation so your student-athletes can compare their performances. This serves as a barometer so athletes can realistically evaluate themselves and make a determination as to what they must do to</p> | <p>compete or if they can compete and at what collegiate level.</p> <p>F. Encourage students to watch other games so they can observe the skills, size, etc. of competitors. Again this helps the athlete to make a relative appraisal and comparison of his strengths and weaknesses.</p> <p>G. Encourage athletes to observe as many collegiate games as possible. This helps them to visualize the different skill levels at different collegiate levels.</p> |

Strategies to Improve the Evaluative process

- A. Make a list in your athletes' junior year (after the football season) of the level at which you feel they can compete with a degree of success.
- B. Send letters and film to colleges on your junior athletes by May. Include: rosters, test scores, grade point averages, statistics and all pertinent data that will assist recruiters in their efforts to evaluate your players.
- C. Complete the form 48-J on all your junior athletes to determine if they are on target to satisfy the core course requirements. If not, meet with them and their counselors to map out a plan to enroll the student in all the necessary core courses. *Upgrade this form after every semester's final grades are available and review it with the student, counselor and parent. Notify recruiters of completion of core course requirements (or progress toward) and core grade point average.
- D. Encourage students to attend summer camps sponsored by colleges and universities.
- E. Return all communications from colleges and demand that the recruited athletes do the same.
- F. Send film after the second game (athlete's senior year) to the colleges and universities who have expressed interest in your athletes. Send film on other prospects as they demonstrate bona fide college potential during their senior football season.
- H. During and after the senior season continue to monitor students' test taking efforts and core course efforts. Notify colleges of all test scores and core course completion progress.
- I. After the season meet immediately with parents and athletes and explain the process of recruiting. Give them information on what to expect and rules and regulations governing recruiting. * Have the student and parent sign a form indicating they understand recruiting procedures and that a scholarship is not guaranteed but that you will try to help the student as long as he attempts to satisfy academic and test requirements.
- J. Monitor all visits to ensure the student does not over-schedule visits, etc.
- K. Continue to counsel the athlete during the hectic recruiting period.

Following these basic procedures can mean the difference in receiving an athletic scholarship or being left out!



MHSFCA Code of Ethics

Compact Form Finally Approved

At the Winter Meeting of the MHSFCA Board of Directors immediately preceding the Battle Creek Clinic, Mark Covert (Past President, Fenton) offered a highly compacted statement for consideration as the Association's Code of Ethics.

The first proposal for a code of ethics was first submitted for consideration four years ago. It was patterned after the Code of Ethics of the American Football Coaches Association, ran several pages in length and covered every aspect of our profession. While the proposal was regularly discussed by the MHSFCA Board of Directors, various objections could not be resolved.

The following proposal was adopted without opposition:

Purpose: The code is for the best interest of the game and the coaching profession. The ultimate success of these basic principles are the coaches themselves.

Code of Ethics

1. Subscribe to and follow to the letter all rules that apply to football set by the MHSAA.
2. Illustrate leadership in fair play and sportsmanship.
3. Consider all safety and health measures for all players.
4. Promote educational standards of your school.
5. Conduct oneself as a role model for your players, coaches, school and community.

Membership (Ethics Committee): The committee shall consist of at least five members appointed by the President of the MHSFCA. They shall meet at each Association meeting as other committees do.

This committee has no power to punish offenders but will reserve the right to notify, through the President of the Association, the school and coach of any charges that have been verified.

The committee can suggest sanctions such as: revoking membership and all rights thereof, notification of the MHSAA and any other actions consistent with promoting the best conditions for the sport of football.

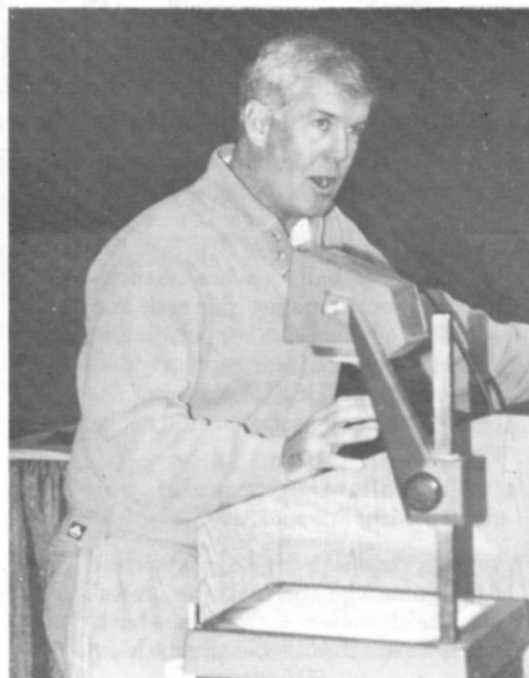

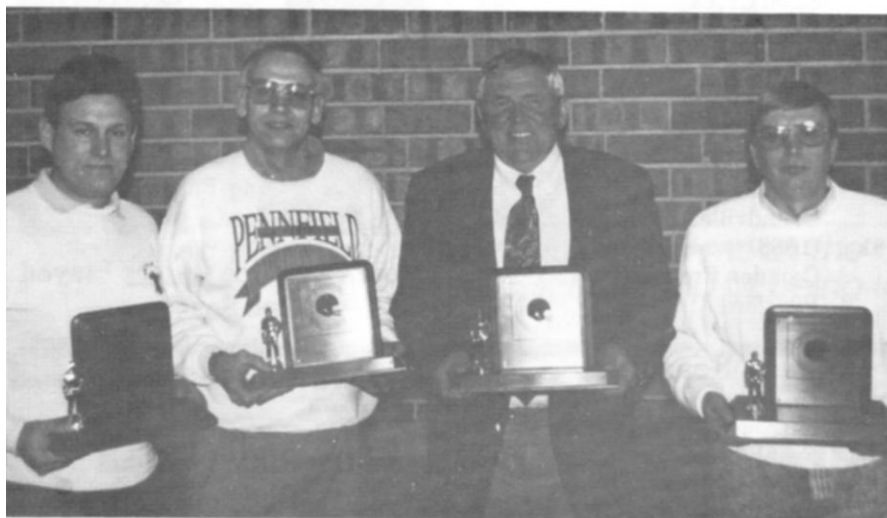
Highlights of Saturday's Banquet Include Acceptance of Crowley Award

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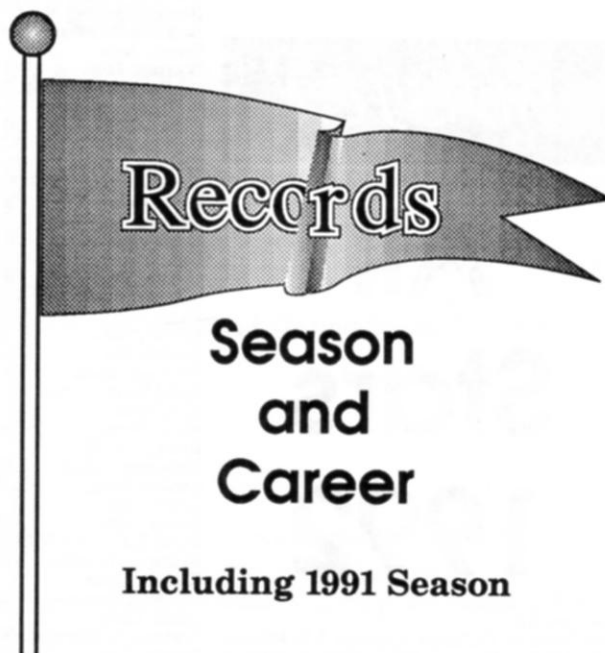
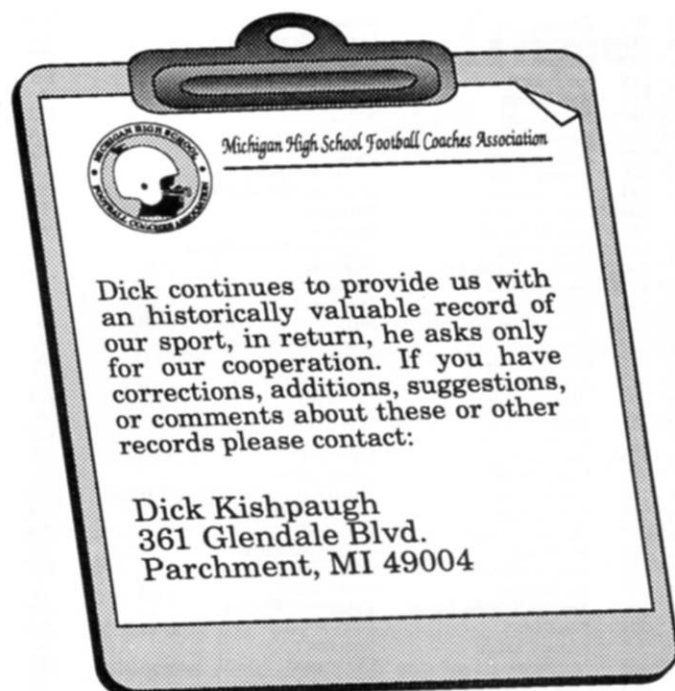

Vicksburg High School's Off Tackle Trap

By Denny Patzer

Head Football Coach Vicksburg High School.

Vicksburg High School is a class B high school that competes in the Wolverine Conference. In the last five years the off tackle trap has become our number one rushing play for two reasons:

1. It is the complementary play for our dive.
2. It is a good match for small offensive linemen.

This play has achieved another fringe benefit in that it gives our linemen (aka grunts) an opportunity for recognition and glory. We have had guards earn All League honors four out of five years. At Vicksburg, our guards are usually in the 155 to 170 lb. category, our tackles 190 to 210 lbs., and tight ends 160 to 175 lbs. We feel we can be successful as a team if we run the football. Basically, we teach our linemen to block horizontally (East and West) on the LOS and create seams for the running backs.

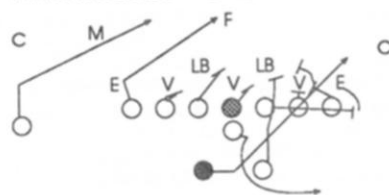
Our dive series is numbered by 20 and the off tackle holes are 5 and 6 so this play is called 25 or 26. The trap begins with a double team by the tackle and tight end. Whether the end releases to a LBer depends on the defense. We believe the guard holds the two keys to the success of this play. First, the guard's lead step must be into the LOS (getting depth is a capital offense). Second as the guard reaches the point of attack, he must read and execute either a KICKOUT or HOOK block on the defensive end. We prac-

tice this over and over during group work against both even and odd defensive fronts.

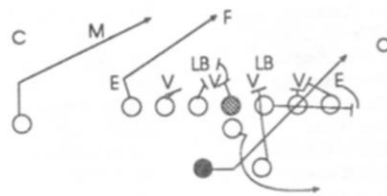
We are now ready to add the running backs to the drill to force them to read the guard's block and make the cut inside or outside. Our rule is that the guards (grunts) never make a poor block, but the backs (glory boys) are responsible for making the proper cut. Our linemen have a lot of fun with this in practice and it has become a source of pride for them on Friday nights.

Basic Blocking Schemes vs an Even and an Odd Front

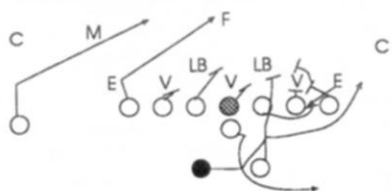
When DE crosses LOS **5-2**



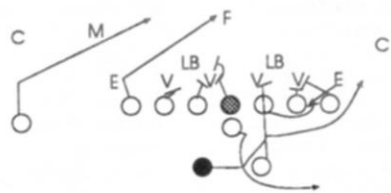
When DE crosses LOS **6-2**

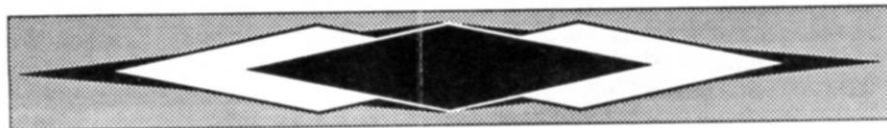

Walt Braun Awarded '92 Crowley Award at MHSFCA Clinic Banquet

The Jim Crowley Award is the most prestigious award given by the Michigan High School Football Coaches Association and is in honor of the late Jim Crowley, the long-time coach at Jackson St. John High School and Jackson Lumen Christi High School, who was tragically killed in 1980, just two short months after winning his second state football title.

Webster defines the word courageous as - having the mental strength to venture, persevere, and withstand danger, fear or extreme difficulty with firmness of mind and will in a determination to achieve one's goal. This definition certainly describes this year's recipient of the Jim Crowley Award.

Walt Braun graduated from Romeo High School in 1952. He received his B.S. in education from Central Michigan University in 1956 and a Master of Arts in physical education and athletic administration from Central in 1959. Walt got his first football coaching job at Brown City

High School right out of college in 1956, becoming one of - if not the - youngest head football coach in Michigan. He had a rather inauspicious beginning as his team was winless in his first season, certainly not an indication of things to come. He coached four years at Brown City and five years at Oxford High School before taking the head coaching job at Marysville in 1965. Over the past twenty-seven years at Marysville Walt has coached: track, baseball, wrestling, and basketball (varsity and junior varsity), but it is in football
