1993 Jim Crowley Award Presented to Traverse City's Jim Ooley

The Jim Crowley Award is presented in the memory of the late Jim Crowley, a great coach and dedicated family man who was tragically killed at the height of his career in 1980 at the age of 45. Coach Crowley stressed having fun, playing hard and being dedicated to doing your best to the many young men he coached in seventeen seasons at Jackson St. John's and Lumen Christi High Schools.

Our 1993 recipient is a Chicago native whose family moved to Menomonie, Wisconsin when he was about to enter high school. Following high school, where he was captain of the football team and played basketball, Jim attended the University of Wisconsin - Stout. While at Stout Jim played football for four years, earning all conference in 1950.. After spending the 1951 season as a graduate assistant at Stout, Jim entered the service and was stationed in Germany. While there he continued to play football as well as basketball. Upon leaving the service, Jim secured a teaching position in the Traverse City Public

Jim Ooley Named '93 Crowley Award Recipient

Schools. He served as junior varsity coach for four seasons and varsity assistant for ten seasons prior to being named the head coach in 1967. For the next twenty-five years Jim guided the fortunes of the T.C. Trojans, and in that time compiled an outstanding 179-60-4 record; his teams were in the first state sponsored football playoff finals in 1975 and won state titles in 1978, 1985 and 1988. In all, his teams were state playoff qualifiers on eight occasions.

Jim Ooley's coaching honors include being named MHSFCA Regional Coach of the Year twelve times, MHSFCA Class A Coach of the Year three times, Detroit Free Press Coach of the Year, Associated Press Coach of the Year, induction into the MHSFCA Hall of Fame and the University of Wisconsin - Stout Hall of Fame. Jim was recently honored as the MHSFCA 1992 Coach of the Year and has been nominated for National Coach of the

Year.

Jim has served the MHSFCA well. He was an original director in 1972, when the association was formed, served as its president in 1982, was an All Star Coach in 1982 and, as a past president, is a member of the Hall of Fame Committee. Our recipient truly loves the game of football and loves sharing his knowledge with other coaches... veterans or rookies. Wherever he is he's always ready to take pen in hand and X and O with fellow coaches.

Jim's wife, Nancy, once said to him, "Jim, you love football more than you love me."

Jim replied, "Yes, but I love you more than I love basketball."

The old green hat is missing from the sideline at Thirlby Field in Traverse City but the legend lives on. Jim Ooley is presented with the 1993 Jim Crowley Award not only because of his work with our association but also for

his many contributions to the game of football and to the lives of the countless number of players he has coached during his forty year career. Congratulations Jim.

Michigan State University Coach George Perles wrapped-up Friday's College Night presentations with interesting reflections on MSU football and insights into the future of college football and of the NCAA.

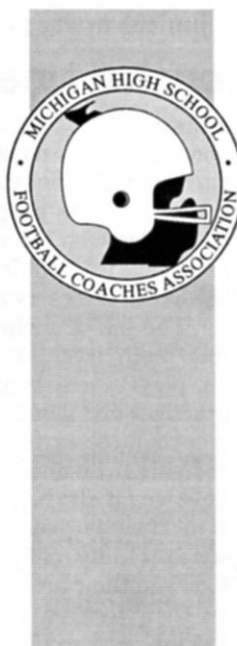

Offensive Line Play

Utilization of Sled, Chutes and Boards During Practice

As coaches of junior varsity football players, who are primarily freshmen and sophomore athletes, we feel that all of our practice sessions should be as simple and yet demanding as possible.

Our practices consist of very basic blocking schemes that demand both skill and knowledge of the game. Not much thought is given to the teaching aspect of coaching, but at the junior varsity level we spend a predominant amount of time teaching blocking concepts so that when these athletes move to the varsity level, they can work more on finesse and definition.

With the following explanations, it is our wish to give you as many ideas as we can about what we have done to create what we feel is a great junior varsity program at Battle Creek Central.

Offensive Line Philosophy

Coaching offensive line players, as anyone in the coaching ranks can tell you, is not easy. As coaches of young players who are still growing and developing, we feel that our practices should be made simple. We use basic terminology and use drills which emphasize both hard work and thinking.

Our major goal during the first couple of weeks of practices is to mold a group of young men from several different junior high schools into a unique and proud unit. We stress a "team within a team" concept. Players at this level become very proud to become part of the offensive line "team." During each talk and meeting, we discuss the concept that the offensive line is a unique family of players who have

a unified job to do – block. We talk about how we are not going to get the job done unless we mold together as a "team" of seven people on the line of scrimmage who, together, want to open huge gaps in the defensive line so that the backs can carry the ball.

The job of molding an offensive line "team" is not easy. We give each of our players a nickname to use during practices and games. The kids love to give themselves nicknames. It creates individual team identity and we believe that it also helps morale. The use of nicknames gives the offensive line a sense of unity and pride and fun. The kids yell their nicknames, wear them on their jerseys, put them on their lockers, and even the parents show

pride by putting their child's nickname on the picture buttons made for us by the Gridiron Club.

We feel that our practice sessions should be demanding and tough. We divide our practices for linemen into two fifteen minute periods. During the first fifteen minutes, we give ourselves ample time on the sled, chutes and boards. Some days we work more on the sled, other days more on the chutes and boards. The players are able to determine which equipment they most need to work on based on game films viewed on Fridays. At Monday practices, the offensive line team has already analyzed, based on game films, exactly on which equipment they will devote the most time.

Sled Drills

A lot of offensive line coaches pride themselves in having their players drive the sled down the practice field. We also teach the players to "drive" the sled down the practice field, but we use the following drill to sharpen skills while using the sled.

We do not work on speed, rather we emphasize blocking the sled correctly for a period of seven seconds and then releasing it. Always establish the use of proper technique with your players in order to establish the good habits which junior varsity players can carry on to the varsity level.

The following drill is called the Hit-Repeat-Attack Drill. Start with two lines facing each other. On the coach's whistle, the offensive player at the

bottom right on the diagram, steps and form blocks the first dummy on the sled. He does not stop. He then steps left, shuffling his feet as he goes, never crossing his feet or legs and repeats the same form fit block on the third dummy. Then the same procedure is repeated on the fifth and seventh dummy on the seven position sled.

After the seventh dummy, the offensive blocker attacks the opposing player who has jogged down the opposite side of the sled. The following things are emphasized with the players:

1. Use good technique. Do not focus on speed.
2. Watch dummy pads. Make sure you use proper blocking fit on the pad.

3. Move your feet – wide, choppy steps upon contact. Drive the dummy.

4. Upon release at the seventh dummy, attack with your helmet at the front numbers of the opposing player using proper fit technique.

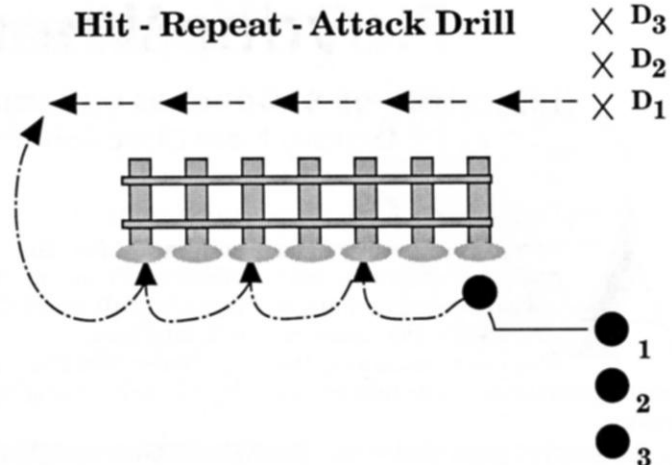
Variations

We use only one variation of this drill and it is very simple.

Between sled pads, we use a roll technique. We try to emphasize that offensive line players are going to get knocked down, knocked into one another and that sometimes with inexperienced linemen, the turf is going to

trip them. It is essential that each player gets up and continues to block down field until the whistle blows.

In all our sled drills, we impress on our players that most plays last for about seven to ten seconds from the snap of the ball. We block the sled for seven seconds minimum. Call it "over block," but we feel that linemen should sustain the block. When watching game film, the players and coaches pay close attention to whether blocking is sustained at least seven seconds or until the whistle blows. The linemen take pride in establishing a team of linemen who consistently sustain their blocks. This creates a sense of pride and unity.



Chute and Board Drill

I have designated A, B and C on the diagram. This is where to place the defensive player.

First we work on the stance, alignment and positioning for point D on the diagram. We continuously push for good technique while the players assume stances. Since we have already talked about technique by the time we hit the chute, I want to emphasize the

at position A on the diagram. He straddles the board and uses a line-backer stance. We then call our cadence and use the same technique as we did in the first step of the drill, only now we form fit block the defensive player. This is called Full-go – attacking the defensive player all the way out of the chute and down the board.

Third and fourth, we move our defensive player to position B and A respectively and go two times through each drill. We feel that this way the offensive player is able to react to the defensive line player in three positions – all the way to the end of the board, half way to the end of the board (where the block will happen faster) and then as close to the chute (where the block happens as if the player is on the line of scrimmage during game conditions), as possible.

angle so that we have a little variation of the explosion and foot movement on the boards.

The first two times through the drill we move the boards to the right (position 1 on the diagram). The next two times through we move the boards to the left (position 2 on the diagram). Last, the defensive players are moved to positions A, B and C on the boards also at an angle out of the chute.

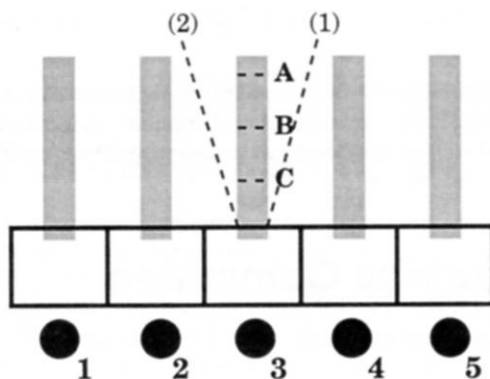
We find that doing all these drills and following consistency with form and movement, we have been able to create an offensive machine, a group that works in unison. The linemen find this drill challenging and frequently ask to do more of them.

Throughout our practice sessions, we attempt to keep the tempo brisk. Our linemen know that they have been through fifteen minutes of tough, vigorous exercise and drill.

At the beginning, we stated that we have two fifteen minute sessions. Our second fifteen minute session is used primarily for "play recognition." This is the mental part of the practice. The practice intensity does not slow. We do a lot of "walk-through" schemes during this part of the practice session.

During the offensive line practice with the rest of the team, we establish a competitive pride in being the first one back to the huddle. We always stress the concepts of alertness and togetherness. We want the opponents to say, "Now this group of offensive linemen are a b___!"

Chute/Board Drill



importance of exploding the stance through the chute, keeping low and positioning the feet along the side of the boards all the way out of the chute and board until everyone hears the whistle. When they do, they release and jog back to the end of the line, forming on position D of the diagram.

Second, we place a defensive player

1. Good stance and position
2. Good movement out of the chute
3. Movement of the feet
4. Good form and fit on the block
5. Block until the whistle blows
6. Offense wins

Playoffs Where To Next?

Survey of Coaches and Lack of Action By MHSAA Dictate New Direction for Playoff Committee

As we go over inventory and ready our orders for next season's team, we want to share with you some recent news concerning the playoffs, and the direction that we are heading.

426 coaches responded to the survey of head coaches across the state conducted in the fall of 1992 to determine whether to work to expand the playoffs or to keep them the same. 217 wanted to expand and 209 wanted to keep the same format. The Board of Directors and the Playoff Committee did not feel this was a strong enough mandate from coaches to follow through with an expansion format. As a result of the survey we will be working to improve the way the present playoff system works.

On Monday, January 25th, at the MHSAA office in East Lansing, the State Football Committee met to discuss the recently completed playoffs and to talk about rules and points of

emphasis for the 1993 season. MHSFCA President, Bob Knight (Portage Central), and I (Tim Klein) were in attendance.

Under New Business at that meeting, the first topic of discussion was to

expand to eight qualifying teams per region rather than four, with the first round of playoff games to be played on the ninth date of the regular season. This idea died in committee for lack of support, and no motion was made.

Point two was a proposal by the Playoff Committee to change the playoff point schedule to include separate

points for classes AA, BB, CC and DD at a level higher than those given for classes A, B, C and D. This motion was defeated by an 2*-11 vote.

Point three was a proposal by our committee to replace the present system of pre-determined Regional competition with a system to select the 16 schools with the highest point totals in each class and then assign the match-ups. This proposal was rejected unanimously.

After much discussion and thought, it was generally felt by all in attendance that what we have is unique and "works," for the most part, for all schools involved.

We (MHSFCA Playoff Committee) feel that our focus for 1993 will be to seek financial help from the state office with greater assistance to schools to offset the costs incurred by teams as they go through the playoff experience.

If you have any thoughts or ideas concerning the playoffs, please send them along to me.

Note:

The Football Committee of the MHSAA, while rejecting the three suggestions mentioned by Tim Klein above, did take one piece of positive action in regards to the playoffs: "The number of cheerleaders allowed at playoff games was increased to the number used during the regular season. If this number exceeds ten (including mascot) permission must be secured from the MHSAA."

Additional Actions by MHSAA Football Committee

Player Disqualification

The Football Committee of the MHSAA "expressed concern over hasty and mistaken disqualifications of players during football games." The committee unanimously recommended the following procedure for officiating teams be approved by the Representative Council of the MHSAA.

The observing official will flag the action and report his observations to the referee (crew chief) who will verify the penalty and consequences. If necessary the entire officiating team will join the conference. If disqualification is necessitated, both benches will be notified immediately and penalty yardage assessed.

Mercy Rule

The committee also recommended the *Wisconsin Experiment* as an alternative to the mercy rule adopted two years ago. The *Wisconsin Experiment* provides for a running clock during the second half, after a point differential of 35 points has been reached.

'93 Contact Practice to be Cut by Three Days?

"Universal Starting Date" Mandated by MHSAA Pushes Three Day Conditioning Workouts into Three Week Contact Schedule.

The MHSAA's policy of a Universal Starting Date (All fall sports practices start on the Monday of the week of the 15th of August) causes a "particular problem" for football practices, said a letter from MHSFCA President, Dave Woodcock (Jenison), to MHSAA Executive Director, John Roberts. The problem, caused by the natural shift of the calendar, causes football to lose three days in pads in two out of every seven years. This problem was discussed by the MHSFCA Board of Directors at their Winter Meeting, just prior to the Battle Creek Clinic. At the conclusion of the meeting a motion was offered, that if accepted by the MHSAA, would resolve the problem. That motion was adopted UNANIMOUSLY by the Board of Directors and Officers of the MHSFCA. President Woodcock's letter, to John Roberts explains the problem and proffers the solution presented in the motion:

In a seven year cycle, high school football is presented with a particular problem in two of those years. In five of the seven years high school football has three conditioning days in shorts and helmets prior to pad practice. They then have three full weeks in pads before the first game. In these other two years because of the universal fall starting date football loses three days in pads. Because the conditioning days plus the three weeks in pads were developed for the safety of the player, the MHSFCA would like an exception to the universal starting date in those two years that eliminate those three days. The MHSFCA feels that it is important to have three full weeks in pads before the first game.

Dave's letter was dated February 2, in plenty of time so that it could be presented to the MHSAA Representative Council meeting in March so that, if acted upon, it could be implemented in the fall of 1993.

MHSFCA Leadership Conference to Be Redesigned

In response to student leaders' post-conference surveys the Substance Abuse Committee, under the direction of Chair Chuck Salvano and members, Loren Willey (Clio) and Jack Crabtree (Saline) has committed to redesigning the conference. (Conference dates for 1993 are August 6 & 7.)

Working with a format that was composed predominantly of academic, "lecture" type experiences the first three Leadership Conferences met with moderate success. In redesigning the conference the goal of the Committee is to provide "hands-on" experiences in problem solving that student leaders can implement immediately in situations they encounter every day.

The Conference Committee has set a meeting date of March 20 at 10:00 a.m. at Saline High School* in order to work out the program for the 1993 Leadership Conference. Interested coaches and others are invited to attend and contribute to this planning session.

Purpose: The code is for the best interest of the game and the coaching profession. The ultimate success of these basic principles are the coaches themselves.

Code of Ethics

1. Subscribe to and follow to the letter all rules that apply to football set by the MHSAA.
2. Illustrate leadership in fair play and sportsmanship.
3. Consider all safety and health measures for all players.
4. Promote educational standards of your school.
5. Conduct oneself as a role model for your players, coaches, school and community.

Membership (Ethics Committee): The committee shall consist of at least five members appointed by the President of the MHSFCA. They shall meet at each Association meeting as other committees do.

This committee has no power to punish offenders but will reserve the right to notify, through the President of the Association, the school and coach of any charges that have been verified.

The committee can suggest sanctions such as: revoking membership and all rights thereof, notification of the MHSAA and any other actions consistent with promoting the best conditions for the sport of football.
