The Newsletter is the official publication of the Michigan High School Football Coaches Association with the expressed aim of keeping the membership informed.

1981 Major Rule Revisions

Legalized use of molded sole shoes with non-removable cleats or studs no more than ½" in length or non-abrasive material with no cutting edge.

Defined blocking below waist. There should be no blocking below the waist by any player who is out side the free blocking zone except to tackle the runner or a player pretending to be a runner.

Defined a chop block as a delayed block at the knee or below against an opponent who is in contact with a team-mate of the blocker in the free blocking zone with a 15 yard penalty.

An invalid fair catch signal is any signal by a player that does not meet the requirement of a valid signal. Penalty 5 yards.

An illegal fair catch signal is a valid signal given by a player when a fair catch is not permissible by rule. Penalty 5 yards.

Delete crawling definition and penalty.

Revised spearing definition as the intentional use of the helmet in an attempt to punish an opponent.

Allows intermission between halves to be increased to 20 minutes upon proper notification.

Added authority for officials to delay a game when weather conditions are hazardous.

Ball becomes dead when a loose ball is simultaneously caught or recovered.

Loss of down added to penalty for illegal forward handling.

Prohibits blocking the kicker of a free kick until he has advanced 5 yards beyond his free kick line or the kick has touched the ground or any other player.

Allow tripping of runner or pretended runner.

Points of Special Emphasis were: (1) movement of QB just prior to snap (2) team-mates pushing runner (3) defensive team interfering with offensive team's signals.

A Strike Position

Coaches, what happens to you and your program when you face a teacher's strike?

If you've been through one you know that any decision you make has serious implication: if you work, long term animosities develop that make your job even more difficult; if you don't work, your program is set back and can never recover time lost.

Something can be done! To assure your association and insure an uninterrupted season, you need to take action — NOW!

WHAT CAN YOU DO?

First, recognize the fact that you are not alone in facing this interruption. You probably have several other members of your own staff who are teachers. Other fall sports: soccer, swimming, water polo, field hockey, women's basketball, etc. have begun. The band program has already put in vast amounts of time and is in the same position as football and other fall sports. Enlist these people's help! There is definitely strength in number. Meet with other interested parties. Unity of purpose should be quite obvious once you organize.

Offer your co-ordinating council and/or representative council a written policy which all parties involved in fall activities can support. Offer to make an extra effort to show your support of the strike DURING action REGULAR SCHOOL HOURS and perhaps, in the evenings. A very small percentage of other teachers will make this offer. What can we offer? Parent contact is one of our strong points. Established access to media, letter writing, and speaches to the public and Booster Clubs regarding the strike. You may even work on extra picket duty. These are some of the areas where you can demonstrate your value to your association while still participating in extra-curricular endeavors.

A pro or con position in relation to the strike need have no importance to these activities, for the most part, all that would be asked is an effort to "educate" the community as to the issues.

We all know the arguments for not interrupting fall programs with a strike. One remains at the top of the

list: time lost in football cannot be made up as it will be, by law, IN THE CLASSROOM.One of our most effective arguments might be to illustrate what is actually lost in student contact during a work stoppage. For instance, with only three teaching members of our staff not present at football practice, we lose approximately 108 hours of practice during the course of a twelve day strike! That's two-thirds of an entire school year! That is time lost. It cannot be made up during winter break, or by cancelling IT IS LOST!

One thing we should not do is to wait until a strike is imminent. When the strike begins you will be backed with proverbial "rock and a hard place." unless you have made effective provisions for that eventuality well ahead of its happening.

Fall sports and band people can be important and influential association members. By acting in unison for our common purpose and educating your local in regard to our unique position, an argument can be reached where all parties are winners instead of all parties being losers. There is nothing you cannot accomplish with good preparation . . and unity!
