Takes...Great Nerve? Intestinal Fortitude? A Degree of Insanity? Whatever it takes Tom Fagan seems to have it.

Once again Tom and his "crew" provided a very well organized Hall of Fame Banquet and Awards evening Saturday April 11, on the floor of Crysler Arena in Ann Arbor.

The time limit of 30 seconds set on the 21 inductees for their acceptance comments, while not "religiously adhered to," certainly helped to keep a necessarily lengthy program within reasonable bounds ...and, if anything, prompted the outstanding group of coaches inducted to be not only concise and profound, but also entertaining. Their comments left little room to doubt why the Hall of Fame inductees have enjoyed long and successful careers as one after another of the honorees thought first to thank the family, players, assistant coaches (or head coaches), and myriad others that "had made 'their' awards possible."

Another feature of the Hall of Fame Awards Banquet has been the sly humor of "Bo" Schembechler, host and "official introducer." This year "Bo's" wit was turned to the task of introducing his long time boss and friend, Don Canham, University of Michigan Athletic Director.

Keeping to the spirit of the evening Mr. Canham's remarks were brief. His general theme, that athletics provides many positive opportunities that are often obscured by a few negatives, was well taken by the crowd assembled to honor 21 men who have dedicated their lives to providing those positive opportunities

FOOTBALL ?

What ARE Colleges and Universities Looking for

Many high school players and their parents would like to see their son win a football scholarship to a major, Division I university. As coaches we know that the chances of this happening are very slim.

We've compiled the following information which we distribute to our players and their parents in the spring.

College Freshman eligibility requirements affect all high school athletes eligible for NCAA Division I athletic scholarships and those who plan to participate as a non-scholarship, walk-on, player. This rule took effect August 1, 1986. It should be noted that Division II schools are planning to enact a similar rule for 1988 graduates.

The rule has two basic requirements both of which must be met.

- Players must acheive a minimum 700
 combined score on the SAT verbal and
 math sections, or a minimum 15 composite
 score on the ACT. If you think you might be
 college material you should test early in
 case you need to take the test again.
- Achieve a 2.0 GPA on a 4.0 scale in a core curriculum of at least 11 academic courses.
 See Proposal 48 for academic details.

Recruiting questions asked of high school coaches (by Don James, University of Washington):

- 1. Can he be a great player, not just could he play some day?
- 2. Is he dying to play college football?
- Is he physically and mentally tough? Mental toughness is most important, tough times don't last; tough people do.
- Is he a team player? Team players are invaluable. A team player is willing to accept any position or role that's good for the team.
- Does he come early to practice and stay late? Clock watchers will never be successful.
- Is he a leader? Not the locker room lawyer type. Most great leaders say little but let their actions speak for them.
- Is he a good citizen? No "hoods," drug users, or other unsavory individuals are wanted.
- 8. Is this individual a competitor who does not make excuses or blame others for team or individual shortcomings? University coaches feel competitors will win.

Set your goals at a realistic level and then work as hard as you can to make yourself the best you can be, whether that's a good ninth grade player, a good JV team player, a specialty player or a starter on offense or defense. Strive to be a great high school player, and the rest will take care of itself. If you are that rare athlete with college potential you will be discovered; recruiters are always looking for real potential and talent.

NCAA Proposal 48 (Now THE Rule)

The Core Courses:

- 1. English (3 full years or 6 semesters of course work in grammar, non-remedial vocabulary development, composition, literature, analyitcal reading, oral communication) 3 Units required.
- 2. Mathematics (Two full years or 4 semesters of course work in mathematics, geometry, algebra, trigonometry, statistics, and calculus) 2 Units required.
- 3. Social Science (2 full years or 4 semester hours of course work in history, social studies, economics, geography, psychology, sociology, government, political science, or anthropology) 2 Units required.
- 4. Natural/Physical Science (2 full years or 4 semesters of biology, chemistry, physics, environmental science, botony, geology [one full year of science must be a *lab* science course) 2 Units required.
- 5. Additional academic course work in other areas: English, math, social science, natural/physical science, foreign language, computer science, speech, religion, or philosophy. 2 Units required.

*Vocational, personal service, remedial, special education, or compensatory courses do not fulfill the core course requirements.

*A player who does not meet these requirements may still receive financial aid if the player has a 2 pt on a 4 pt scale, <u>but will be ineligible as a freshman and will foreit 1 of the 4</u> seasons permitted for competition.

Selecting the RIGHT College or University

A Guide to Assist Student Athletes and Their Parents

by Ray Smith Hope College (Re-printed with permission)

Seven Questions Parents Should Ask Recruiters:

- 1. Has the college recruited my son with honesty, integrity and complete adherence to NCAA rules?
- 2. Is the head coach genuinely concerned with my son's future and does his coaching philosophy lend support to that future?
- 3. Are the assistant coaches loyal to the head coach, and do they carry that loyalty over to my son's welfare?
- 4. Is there someone on the staff who will give my son the personal attention necessary to mature athletically on the field and academically off the field?
- 5. Is the community involved in supporting the staff and the studentathlete?
- 6. What about my son's health needs during training periods of the season, and what happens if my son is injured? Insurance?
- 7. Is the college growing the way I would like to see my son grow?

Important Factors to Consider About the School

1 Athletic

 A. Facilities: stadium, locker rooms, practice fields, training room, weight room, athletic offices

- B. Head Coach: Won-Loss record, Reputation for success, Philosophy of discipline, Stability (will he be head coach on your son's graduation?), Reputation (loyalty of players, coaches, etc.)
- C.Assistant Coaches: Position coach, Personal interest in each player
- D. Type of Program: Offensive and defensive philosophy, Depth at respective positions, current players (loyal to program?), community support and attendance, future schedules, Chances of post-season play, success of program in last 5 years, Last 10 years
 - E. Community Support: attendance, booster clubs
- F. Other Sports: Philosophy of excellence for all sports, available facilities, success in all sports, National recognition (individual and team)
- G. Adherence to NCAA Rules: There is no substitute for honesty and integrity during recruiting

II. Academics

A. Facilities: National reputation of college, on campus buildings, Campus grounds and surroundings, Library and study areas, Academic advisors, Academic support center, Post-graduate scholarships and grants, Summer school programs, Professor/student ratio

- B. Involvement and Philosophy of Academics: By coaching staff, By administration, By other faculty members, By community (businessmen, etc.
- C. Financial Aid: SEOG and government grants, National Direct Student Loan (NDSL), Student employment, Guarenteed student loan (GSL), Presidential scholarships, National Merit Scholarships, Distinguished scholar awards, Valedictorian scholarships, Alumni honor scholarships

III. Social

- A. Opportunities: Weather, Environment and lifestyle, Night life, Recreational activities, Winter sports, Water sports, Local sports, friends or relatives in the area
- B. Housing: Dormitory facilities (clean, modern, convenient), accessibility to campus and recreation, apartment facilities in area
- C. Job Opportunities: Campus jobs, Career opportunities after graduation, Number of student-athletes who remain in the area, Standard of living in the community, Economic growth of area
- D. Family and/or relatives: Opportunities to see games, distance to campus, Facilities available when parents visit, Frequency of son's visiting home


