

skills is the most effective way we can help them deal with the problems in our society today.

In order to address this need the MHSFCA Board of Directors has decided to offer a series of two workshops to develop student leaders who will influence their peers to lead healthy responsible lives. The Leadership Workshops will each be two day programs and will involve students, coaches, sponsors, and administrators. The leaders attending will receive instruction in alcohol/drug awareness, decision-making skills, communications skills, setting goals, coping with peer pressure, peer pressure reversal, and developing a positive self-image. Each subject will be addressed in large group and small group sessions.

The two day workshops were conceived by the Substance Abuse Committee in co-operation with the workshop staff of Mike Marek, Greg Harden, Tim Fagan and Al Dicken.

It is our hope that the leaders attending either of the workshops will implement their newly developed skills by conducting leadership workshops in their own schools and conferences. The MHSFCA feels our future lies in the hands of our youth, and the more positive experiences we can contribute to their lives, the more positive and constructive all our futures will be.

The workshops will be held at:

- 1. The University of Michigan on Thursday, June 28 and Friday, June 29. The cost of this workshop will be \$45 per adult and \$10 per student athlete.
- 2. Michigan State University on Friday, July 27 and Saturday, July 28. The cost of this workshop will be \$45 for each coach and \$45 for each athlete. The workshop fee will include registration, room and board at MSU's Holden Hall, and All Star Game tickets.

New Camp Funding Regulations

from MHSAA

After more than two years of study and discussion and a review at all ten 1989 Update Meetings, a 180-degree change is occurring in MHSAA regulations and interpretations regarding the funding of students' participation in athletic camps out-of-season.

At its fall meeting in Detroit the MHSAA Representative Council placed schools in control of the funds used to send students to out-of-season camps. The following changes have been made and are effective immediately:

 Interpretation #83 of amateur regulations has been revised to read:

"A camp may not reduce or wave fees for any individual or team. Full or partial scholarships to athletic camps may be accepted by students without violating the amateur regulation, provided the funds are paid by:

"(1) the student's parents, grandparents or siblings; or

"(2) the school district, not with general funds, but with funds generated through school approved fund raising activities of booster clubs, school teams, student groups, and community, civic or service groups and are not provided to students on the basis of athletic ability or potential."

Item 1(C) of regulation II, Section 11 (G) has been revised to read (bold type is new):

"No payment with school district funds of entry fees for teams or individuals to camps or competition unless those funds were generated through school approved activities of booster clubs, school teams, student groups, and community, civic, or service groups and are not provided to students on the basis of athletic ability or potential."

3. A maximum limit on the amount of money that may be paid with approved school funds on behalf of any one student to participate in out-of-season camps, clinics or competition has been established: \$200 per sport — per vear (September through August).

This changes previous regulations which have prohibited any funds from any school account to be used for the payment of entry fees for teams or individuals to camps or competition out-of-season.

High Schools Test Athletes for Drugs

High Schools in Illinois and Alaska have begun testing studentathletes to detect the use of narcotics and steroids.

Homewood-Flossmoor High School, 30 miles south of Chicago, ILL., began testing of student-athletes last month [February 1990], Alaska's Ketchican High School has instituted the "Rapid Eye Test" (RET) as part of its testing program, and the Fairbanks Public School District began to test the legality of its [drug use testing] practice.

Superintendent Edward J. Rachford told Athletic Director, that the Homewood-Flossmoor Board of Education adopted its policy in September, following a request from the football coach to test his players for substance abuse. He said the policy is based on a procedure used by Tippecanoe, Indiana's Public School District, which has the support of a 1989 ruling by the Federal Court of Appeals.

"There have been incidents," Rachford said, "The coach talked about his frustration with the (football program), and we have reasons to believe his suspicions."

Before the plan was implemented this year, Rachford said the student government conducted a survey of the school's 2,000 students. He said the project received 1,500 responses, with more than 1,100 endorsing random testing. The local Parent-Teacher Association reported that 86 percent of its membership supported testing, based on 200 responses from its own survey.

Rachford said 15 student-athletes will be selected each week, based on a weekly drawing of names. They will submit urine samples for testing 10 common drugs, including marijuana, amphetamines, barbiturates, cocaine and alcohol. Although there is no evidence of steroid use among the team members, two of the 15 students will be randomly selected for a separate test to determine use.

When chemical dependency is detected, the student-athlete must enter a treatment program and accept a suspension from team play during counseling. The player must then be tested before he can return to the team.

If a player refuses treatment or substance abuse is detected during retesting, the student-athlete can be suspended from team play for periods of two weeks to 12 months. There is no academic penalty.

Each drug urinalysis costs between \$20 and \$25, Rachford said. Testing for alcohol carries another

the season progresses. The test is simple: in the school nurse's office, the student's eyes are checked for their ability to react to light and track a slow moving object. If the player fails, then a urinalysis is required and the student is referred to a physician to determine the cause, which

detecting steroid use is approximately \$100.

Surprisingly, though, the program will not be a financial burden to the Homewood-Flossmore school district, he told AD. An anonymous donor has offered \$25,000 to underwrite the program for one year, and \$1 from every \$3 ticket for home basketball and football games has been earmarked for drug test expenses.

Two other Chicago area schools are conducting random testing on their entire student body population: Willow Brook and Addison Trail. A third high school, Mohamed-Seymore, in southern Illinois, also is testing its entire student population.

At Ketchikan High School approximately 30 percent of the 700 students participate in varsity sports, band, drama and other programs, according to Assistant Principal Don Pennington. The RET program is a prerequisite to all extra-curricular activities.

Pennington, who also administers the test, told Athletic Director that the program is necessary, be-

factors.

Pennington said students are not penalized academically, if chemical dependency is detected. Nor is a police report made. But the student is banned from team competition for the season.

Ketchikan's RET project was inaugurated in 1988, Pennington said. Nearby Sitka High School instituted the policy last fall.

He said the testing program has community support. Ketchikan has 12,000 residents; Sitka is smaller.

Administrators like Rachford and Pennington, though, remain philosophical about the issue.

"I never dreamed of doing it," Rachford said. "(But) it's a matter of conditioning, and we have to start telling students what they need to expect from others, because we are preparing them for life."
