

Head and Neck Injuries in Football

This statement will be read at Football Rules Meetings this fall.

It is a familiar, but welcome story to report that once again in 1992 Michigan high school football was spared of death and catastrophic injury. In fact, there was just one death recorded as a direct result of high school football last year while over 1,500,000 students participated as players in our nation's schools. Statistics are not yet complete on catastrophic injuries, but nine football players died nationally from causes not directly attributable to football.

Statistics on football deaths have been compiled since 1931 and reached a high of 26 from direct causes in 1968. Rule changes for the 1976 season eliminated the head as a primary and initial contact area for blocking and tackling and has been responsible for the direct decrease in deaths since that time. Since 1960 most of the direct fatalities have been caused by head and neck injuries.

You attendance at this year's rules meeting and your membership in the coaches association are indications of your desire to make football a game that is safe for all of our students.

Several suggestions for reducing head and neck injuries include:

- Athletes must be given proper conditioning exercises which will strengthen their necks and enable them to hold their heads firmly erect when making contact.
- Coaches should drill players to properly execute fundamental skills, especially blocking and tackling. Contact should always be made with the head up and never with the top of the head/helmet. Initial contact should never be made with the head/helmet.
- Rules prohibiting spearing should be enforced in practice and in games. Players should be taught to respect the helmet as a protective device, not to used as a weapon.
- 4. Take special care to see that

- player's equipment is properly fitted, especially the helmet.
- 5. When a player has experienced head trauma, he should receive immediate medical attention and not be allowed to return to practice or game without permission from the proper medical authorities.
- Coaches should conduct pre-season meetings with players and parents to explain the risk associated with playing football.

Coaches and officials have key roles in making football safe.

As members of the Michigan High School Football Coaches Association we must enthusiastically join the MH-SAA in pursuit of making the game free from serious injury.

MHSAA Exploring New Facility

Mr. Roberts said, "[We] may find it possible to provide space for two kinds of services... for an association's Hall of Fame and association management."

Executive Director of the Michigan High School Athletic Association, John E. Roberts, in a communication with the presidents of the various high school coaching associations in Michigan, queried those leaders about their interest in being a part of, "an office complex that will increase the prestige and/or stability of some groups and foster cooperation between all which locate in the complex." Part of the initial discussion is an assessment of the organizations' current and projected space needs.

Mr. Roberts said, "as the MHSAA considers its future space needs, it may find it possible to provide space for two kinds of services which might benefit one or more of the high school coaches organizations for Michigan: Space for an association's Hall of Fame and association management."

"Presently, the MHSAA has neither the staff nor space to perform these functions for state coaches associations." Mr. Roberts added, "but that could change if the educational associations offices complex ever becomes a reality."

"The vision of those now considering the office complex is to promote closer working relationships which will promote collaboration and synergy to improve education in Michigan. If such were occurring with respect to coaches associations within the MHSAA portion of the complex, the spirit of the vision would extend beyond even what the planners have had in mind." He said.

MHSFCA 1972-1992

Thanks to the leadership of the officers and directors, past and present, the Michigan High School Football Coaches Association is in excellent condition. Since its inception, the MHSFCA has been a model for other

coaches associations on how to have input in the direction that the sport they were coaching took.

The organization's purpose has always been to help and promote the sport, the coaches and the young men that they coached. To those ends our promotions have always been focused. The main event of the association for the membership is the annual clinic in Battle Creek which had



over 1,400 members in attendance in January 1993. One of the most prestigious events for the association and for the membership is induction into the Hall of Fame. The induction ceremonies in April of this year raised the number of Hall of Famers to over 250.

Most of the efforts of the organization are directed toward the young men who participate in football. The membership worked very hard to initiate the state playoffs and later to expand them so that more young men could participate. The playoffs now include 128 teams. The MHSFCA offers \$6,000 in scholarships so that young people, both male and female, associated with high school football may further their education. In addition, 88 young men are offered an opportunity to play in the All Star Game in Spartan Stadium in August. In conjunction with the All Star Football Game, we provide an opportunity for approximately 200 high school marching band participants to come to MSU and perform. Also in conjunction with the All Star Game our organization has taken an important step in helping to develop responsible leadership in our high schools by offering a Leadership Conference to students throughout the state. The Association also proudly honors members of our organization with many awards to recognize their contributions and achievements in football. First and foremost is the prestigious

Our activities are conceived and organized by our Association's governing body. The MHSFCA is run by its officers a: President, 1st Vice-President, 2nd Vice-President and Executive Director; thirty-two Regional Directors; committee chairmen; Past Presidents; and Allied Members. These men perform the everyday work that makes the organization successful. Its our well placed hope that the current group of men will continue the success that our previous leadership has engineered.

As President, I have two major goals. The first is to continue immediate Past President, Bob Knight's drive to involve more coaches in the organization... we need all of the help you are willing to give. The other pressing goal is to solve the dilemma of where our Hall of Fame will reside. We need a permanent place to house and display the historical documents of our Association (see article this Newsletter).

Over 600 Honor 27 Inductees at –

1993 MHSFCA Hall of Fame Banquet

The 1993 Hall of Fame Banquet was held at the Michigan Track and Tennis Building instead of the usual site at Crisler Arena. The location change had no effect on the banquet's success, as over 600 people from all over the state of Michigan gathered to honor 27 inductees. Michigan's highly successful head football coach, Gary Moehler, welcomed the huge crowd and introduced the featured speaker, Eastern Michigan's Jim Harkema. Coach Harkema praised and recognized the inductees for their achievements and for making a major difference in their communities. His well prepared presentation, which centered on perception and reality, was thoughtful, entertaining and presented dome interesting insights to the game of football.

The inductees amused and entertained the audience and their families with brief, but insightful comments. As part of the introduction the inductees related their biggest thrill, what coaching has meant to them and why they coach.

Many of the inductees stated that being admitted to the Michigan High School Football Coaches Hall of Fame was their biggest thrill and credited their families and fellow coaches for their success.

Bob Dozier's and Jack Schugars' remarks epitomized the feelings of the rest of the inductees. According to Bob Dozier, "Football coaching has given me the opportunity to give something back to the community in the form of assisting young men and young women to reach their maximum academic, athletic and social potential. Coaching has provided the opportunity for me to learn so much from so many people and to share the camaraderie of the

best group of professionals on the face of the earth, coaches."

Coach Jack Schugars stated, "I coach because in reality coaches never lose — because for a coach the final score doesn't read so many points for my team and so many points for theirs. Instead it reads so many men out of so many boys. And this is the score that I, as a coach, read to myself and find the greatest joy."

Ivy Lofton Head Coach Royal Oak Dondero

Coach Lofton is a graduate of Northwestern High School in Detroit. He is a U.S. Navy Veteran. He received a BS from Michigan and a Specialist degree from Wayne State. Ivy began his coaching career at Detroit Eastern in 1950.

Head and Neck Injuries in Football

This statement will be read at Football Rules Meetings this fall.

It is a familiar, but welcome story to report that once again in 1992 Michigan high school football was spared of death and catastrophic injury. In fact, there was just one death recorded as a direct result of high school football last year while over 1,500,000 students participated as players in our nation's schools. Statistics are not yet complete on catastrophic injuries, but nine football players died nationally from causes not directly attributable to football.

Statistics on football deaths have been compiled since 1931 and reached a high of 26 from direct causes in 1968. Rule changes for the 1976 season eliminated the head as a primary and initial contact area for blocking and tackling and has been responsible for the direct decrease in deaths since that time. Since 1960 most of the direct fatalities have been caused by head and neck injuries.

You attendance at this year's rules meeting and your membership in the coaches association are indications of your desire to make football a game that is safe for all of our students.

Several suggestions for reducing head and neck injuries include:

- Athletes must be given proper conditioning exercises which will strengthen their necks and enable them to hold their heads firmly erect when making contact.
- Coaches should drill players to properly execute fundamental skills, especially blocking and tackling. Contact should always be made with the head up and never with the top of the head/helmet. Initial contact should never be made with the head/helmet.
- Rules prohibiting spearing should be enforced in practice and in games. Players should be taught to respect the helmet as a protective device, not to used as a weapon.
- 4. Take special care to see that

- player's equipment is properly fitted, especially the helmet.
- 5. When a player has experienced head trauma, he should receive immediate medical attention and not be allowed to return to practice or game without permission from the proper medical authorities.
- Coaches should conduct pre-season meetings with players and parents to explain the risk associated with playing football.

Coaches and officials have key roles in making football safe.

As members of the Michigan High School Football Coaches Association we must enthusiastically join the MH-SAA in pursuit of making the game free from serious injury.
