## **Summer Regulation Changes**

The Representative Council approved the following changes regarding coach-player relationships during the summer.

Item one pertaining to football was effective for the summer of 1994 while items two and three will be effective starting the summer of 1995.

1. Prior to August 1, coaches may participate at bona fide summer football skills camps where more than 7 students from their school district in grades 7 through 12 are participating. (Bona fide football camps are those sponsored by institutions or business enterprises including: colleges, individual schools or intermediate school districts, community school programs, etc.) The camps must be open to students from any school district, and are subject to equipment limitations of shoes and helmets.

Camps limited to students entering grades 9 through 12 must be promoted and advertised in public media to be open to students from more than one high school. Camps sponsored by a high school and limited to students entering 9 through 12 may not extend more than 10 days total.

- 2. During the summer prior to August 1, coaches of these team sports are limited to 15 days when they may coach in competition students of their school district in grades 7 through 12 if the teams (Including substitutes) are represented by more than the following player limitations: Soccer (7), Basketball (3), Volleyball (3), Ice Hockey (3). In Football, a maximum of 7 players at one time may engage in organized competition with their school coach present for a maximum of 7 days. (Effective August 1, 1994)
- 3. From August 1 to Monday the week of August 15, coaches of fall season team sports are subject to the player limitations indicated in parentheses when coaching students of their school district in grades 7 through 12 in sport specific activities: Football (7), Boys Soccer (7), and Girls Basketball (3). There is to be no competition between school teams with their school coaches during this period. (Effective August 1, 1995)

#### Interpretations

You cannot participate in a summer passing league before your school has completed its spring semester.

Your team is limited to seven (7) days of competition during the summer.

#### Reminder: Football Rules

- 1. Maximum number of games, 9, for team and player.
- A student may compete in not more than one (1) game of football in five (5) consecutive calendar days.
- Teams must conduct at least three days of practice with only footballs, helmets, and shoes before practicing with pads. (Dummies and hand shields may be used.)
- Teams must conduct three weeks of practice on at least 14 separate days before playing their first game.
- 5. Football practice with pads shall be conducted at the place where practice will be held after school starts.

## Football Coaching Safety 1995

#### This is the message that will be read at the 1995 Football Rules meetings this fall

t is encouraging to report that there were no reported direct fatalities in high school football nationally during the 1994 season. It is also probable that there were only two paralyzing injuries during the last season – none in Michigan! Both figures are decided improvements over previous years – only in 1990 was there another fatality free season in football.

Direct fatalities are those that are caused directly by a traumatic injury, while indirect deaths are caused by systemic failure as a result of exertion while participating or by a complication which was secondary to a nonfatal injury. There were two deaths in the indirect category this year.

Dr. Frederick Mueller at the University of North Carolina is continuing the research projects which have been going on since 1931. At this winter's National Federation Football Rules Meetings, Dr. Mueller credited state association representatives and high school coaches throughout the country for their efforts in successfully reducing the number of fatalities and catastrophic injuries in high school football. Rule changes and safer coaching techniques have had positive effects on the safety of student athletes.

It is important that all coaches report serious head and neck injuries to the MHSAA so that statistical data can be submitted to Dr. Mueller for research.

As we prepare for the 1995 football season, it is imperative that all coaches focus on making the great game of football as safe as possible for the student athletes of our schools.

## SEVERAL SUGGESTIONS FOR REDUCING HEAD AND NECK INJURIES INCLUDE

- Athletes must be given proper conditioning exercises which will strengthen their necks and enable them to hold their heads firmly erect when making contact.
- Coaches should drill players to properly execute fundamental skills, especially blocking and tackling. Contact should always be made with the head up and never with the top of the head/helmet. Initial contact should never be made with the top of the head/helmet.
- Rules prohibiting spearing should be enforced in practice and in games.
   Players should be taught to respect the helmet as a protective device not to be used as a weapon.
- 4. Take special care to make sure that the player's equipment is properly fitted, especially the helmet.
- When a player has experienced head trauma, he should receive immediate medical attention and not be allowed to return to practice or game without permission from the proper medical authorities.
- 6. Coaches should conduct preseason meetings with players and parents to explain the risk associated with playing football.

Coaches and officials have key roles in making football safe. As representatives of the Michigan High School Football Coaches Association we enthusiastically join forces with the MHSAA in pursuit of making the game free from serious injury.

Among the more entertaining items:

Larry Rueger remembered the time he was presented a bouquet of flowers... before the game by the opposing coach, and the time his team successfully ran the flea-flicker—twice in the same season!

Anthony De Fiore (Monroe Catholic Central) told of the time his center

and helped in different ways, I felt confident that I could handle the job and responded favorably, especially since Tom said that he'd get everything organized as he had for the first twelve runnings of the event.

4:30 brought the arrival of Ike Muhlenkamp, ticket manager. Ike was followed shortly by Bill Tucker, asking how he could help. Jeff Smith, who couldn't stay, but had come all the way down from Lansing to drop off door prizes walked in next with his arms full.

Don Lessner asked where the name cards were for the head table. I responded as Tom had told me, "Dick Look is bringing them." Don was unimpressed... "But Dick doesn't usually come down for this." (Oh, ye of little faith!)



## By-Laws

## Michigan High School Football Coaches Association

FOUNDED - MARCH 24, 1972 CHARTERED - MARCH 6, 1972 ADOPTED - MAY, 1973 Revised - August 1984 • Revised - January, 1989 • Revised - March, 1995\*

#### Article I Name

The name of this organization shall be The Michigan High School Football Coaches Association, Inc., and such organization is a corporation not organized for profit.

## Article II Objectives

- To work for the betterment and growth of football in Michigan.
- B. To encourage and help extend participation in football at the senior high school, junior high school and elementary school level.
- C. To secure a better understanding of the problems of coaching football and to place at the disposal of all football coaches sources of information.
- To promote the highest possible professional standards in the

coaching of football.

- E. To study proposed rule changes and make recommendations in rule changes whenever this is considered necessary.
- F. To promote and protect the best possible conditions for the total development of the young men for whom we as football coaches are responsible.
- G. To cooperate with the state athletic office for the betterment of football in the State of Michigan.
- H. To promote a harmonious relationship among coaches in all sports.

## Article III Membership

Section 1

There shall be four classes of membership in this association — Active, Allied, and Honorary and (Lifetime).

Section 2

ACTIVE membership shall include only coaches of elementary, junior, and senior high schools who are actively engaged in or directly associated with coaching football in the State of Michigan.

#### Section 3

Application and election — Each Applicant for active membership shall sign an application blank stating his desire and intention to become a member of the association and to advance its best interests in every reasonable manner and to accept as binding upon himself its Articles of Incorporation, By-Laws (and Code of Ethics.)

Section 4

Membership shall extend from September 1 to August 31 of the following year.

#### Section 5

ALLIED membership shall include any individual who has been or aspires to be an active member.

#### Section 6

HONORARY membership shall be conferred by the Board of Directors. All nominations for honorary membership must be submitted in writing to the chairman of the Honorary Membership Committee by the Winter Meeting for selection.

- A. The Honorary Membership Committee, a standing committee of the Board of Directors, shall approve or disapprove of each nomination. A three-fourths majority of the Board of Directors is necessary for election.
- B. The following guides may be used in awarding honorary memberships:
  - Past Presidents of the association.
  - Dedicated individuals who have contributed outstanding services to the development of football.
- C. Those awarded honorary membership will receive a Lifetime Honorary Membership card as an award of recognition.

#### Article IV

#### **Rights of Membership**

#### Section 1

Active members shall have the following privileges if actively coaching and if a member by October 1.

- A. To voice and vote at all general meetings of the association.
- B. To receive all publications of the association.
- To be eligible for election as Coach of the Year.
- D. To be eligible for election to office.
- E. To be eligible to nominate a player to participate in the All Star Game.
- F. To be eligible to coach in the All Star Game.
- G. To be eligible to nominate a player for the MHSFCA Scholarship.
- H. To be eligible to nominate an assistant coach for Assistant Coach of the Year recognition.
- To be eligible to serve on the Board of Directors and the Executive Board.
- To be eligible to nominate a player for Academic All State.

- K. To be eligible to nominate a child for the Terry Rose Memorial Scholarship.
- (L. To be eligible for the Jim Crowley Award.)

#### Section 2

ALLIED members shall have the following privileges:

- A voice at all general meetings, but no vote.
- B. To receive all publications of the association.

#### Section 3

HONORARY (and LIFETIME) members shall have the following privilege:

 To receive all publications of the association.

#### Article V

#### Dues

An annual membership fee for active and allied members shall be determined by the Board of Directors.

#### Section 1

In the event that the association is disbanded, all monies accrued in the treasury shall be given to Association designated charities.

#### Article VI

## Cancellation of Membership

#### Section 1

Membership in the association shall be suspended at the end of each fiscal year (May 31). Suspension shall be lifted with the payment of the annual dues.

#### Section 2

Any membership may be suspended by a two-thirds vote of the Board of Directors. (For any actions deemed not in the best interest of the association, its members or its reputation. Not limited to, examples might be, violations of the Association By-Laws or Code of Ethics, felonies, state and federal laws.)

#### Section 3

Any member whose membership has been cancelled by a vote of the Board of Directors may appeal directly to the association for reinstatement at a regular annual meeting. The action of a majority of the members shall be final.

#### Section 4

Should a member leave elementary, junior or senior high school coaching or his association with coaching football, he automatically becomes an Allied member for the remainder of the current year.

#### Article VII

#### Voting

#### Section 1

Only Active members shall be allowed to vote.

#### Section 2

Voting shall be either by voice or by ballot, this being at the discretion of the Board of Directors.

#### Article VIII

#### **Officers**

#### Section 1

A President and two Vice-Presidents (a First Vice President-Elect and a Second Vice President-Elect) shall be elected annually by the members of the association.

#### Section 2

An Executive Director shall be appointed by and serve at the discretion of the Board of Directors. The Executive Director shall be paid a salary determined by the Board of Directors. (The salary should be reviewed annually.)

#### Section 3

The positions of Historian, Public Relations Director, and Chaplain shall be filled annually by appointment of the President.

#### Section 4

In order to be eligible for the office of President or Vice-President, a candidate must have served at least one year as an active member of the Board of Directors, and attended at least two-thirds of the meetings. He must also be an active football coach at the time of his selection to be a candidate for these offices.

#### Section 5

The Executive Director, Historian Public Relations Director, and the Chaplain must be a present active member or one who has been an active member.

#### Section 6

Vacancy occurring in the position of President shall be filled by the First Vice-President, with the approval of the Board of Directors. Vacancy occurring in the position of Second Vice-President shall be filled by appointment by the President and approved by the Board of Directors. Vacancy in the position of Executive Director, Historian, Public Relations Director, or Chaplain shall be filled by appointment of the President and approved by the Board of Directors.

#### Section 7

In the event that the offices of President and First and Second Vice-Presidents are vacated, the immediate Past President will assume the duties of the President. In all cases of replaced officers, the term of office will be that of the unexpired term.

#### Article IX

#### **Duties of the Officers**

#### Section 1

President — It will be the President's esponsibility to preside at all meetings and to exercise general supervision over all activities of the Association. The President will serve in an advisory capacity following his one year term in office.

#### Section 2

First Vice-President Elect — It will be the responsibility of the First Vice-President Elect to assume the duties of the President in his absense, with the approval of the Board of Directors. At the conclusion of his term as First Vice-President Elect, he will assume the office of President for the term of one year. The First Vice-President Elect will serve as an ex-officion member of all committees, be responsible for promoting membership, and coordination of the activities of the Association.

#### Section 3

Second Vice-President Elect — It will be the responsibility of the Second Vice-President Elect to assume the luties of the First Vice-President Elect in his absence, with the approval of the Board of Directors. At the conclusion of his term as Second Vice-President Elect, he will assume the office of the First Vice-President Elect for the term of one year. The Second Vice-

President Elect will serve as an exofficio member of all committees, be responsible for promoting membership, and coordinating the activities of the Association.

#### Section 4

Executive Director: It will be the responsibility of the Executive Director to keep the accurate and official minutes of all General Meetings and Board of Director Meetings conducted during his term of office, which will be at least two years. It will be his responsibility to handle all correspondence necessary in conducting the business and social activities of the Association, (with the help of the membership chairman). It will also be his duty to keep accurate rosters of Active, Allied, (Lifetime) and Honorary Members. It will be his responsibility to keep accurate financial records, receive all association funds and collect all dues of all members, pay all indebtedness on order of the President, and provide an accurate financial statement each year at the initial Executive Committe meeting. (The fiscal year shall run from June 1 through May 31 of each year.)

#### Article X

#### The Board of Directors

#### Section 1

The management of the affairs of the association shall be vested in a Board of Directors which shall consist of two (2) directors from each of sixteen (16) regions, the president, two vice-presidents, and Executive Director, an historian, a chaplin, committee chairmen, and past presidents.

#### Section 2

The sixteen regions shall correspond with regions one (1) through fifteen (15) of the regional organization plan of the Michigan Education Association. Region sixteen (16) will correspond with MEA regions 16 through 18.

#### Section 3

Election of directors shall be held at the annual state meeting held at the Coaches Clinic each year.

#### Section 4

A. The term of office of a regional director shall be two years: Regions 1, 3, 5, 7, 9, 11, 13, and 15 electing on odd years and regions

- 2, 4, 6, 8, 10, 12, 14, and 16 electing on even years.
- B. Failure of a region to elect directors at the proper time shall leave that region without such representation until the president recommends for Board approval, a person to fill the vacancy.
- C. Should a member of the Board leave the coaching profession or move to a school in another region, the president shall appoint, upon recommendation of the other director, a temporary director from the region for the remainder of the term.
- D. It is recommended to the president that he instruct the members to seek in their selection of directors, those qualities necessary for future officers as well as men vitally interested in promoting the interest of the association.
- E. To be a director, interested coaches must send letters to the (First Vice President) asking that their names be placed on their regional ballots. The two coaches receiving the highest number of votes will become regional directors.

#### Section 5

The Board of Directors shall have complete control and management of the affairs, funds, and property of the association.

The Finance Committee of the Board of Directors shall audit, or have audited by an independent firm, the financial records of the association once each year and make a report to the Board.

#### Section 6

- A. The Board of Directors shall meet at the following times:
  - The spring meeting will be held on the Friday of the weekend of the Hall of Fame Banquet.
  - The summer meeting will be held to coincide with the All Star Game.
  - The fall meeting will be held on the first (Friday) after the football playoff Final Games in a centrally located city of the state.
  - 4. The winter meeting will be


#### ASSISTANT COACH DAVE FARRIS • PETOSKEY HIGH SCHOOL

#### Article XIV

#### Amendments

#### Section 1

Any proposed amendment shall be submitted to the Board of Directors at any regular or called meeting of the Board.

#### Section 2

The proposed amendment, together with the opinion of the Board of Directors, shall be read at a regular meeting of the association. A two-thirds majority of the members present shall

be necessary for the adoption of the said amendment.

#### Article XV

#### Resolutions

Resolutions shall be adopted by a majority vote of the Active members present.

#### Article XVI

#### Miscellaneous

Not with standing any other provisior of these By-Laws, upon the dissolution of the Michigan High School Footbal Coaches Association (unincorporated) and the transfer of its assets to this organization, this organization shall succeed to all of the rights, obligations and responsibilities of such unincorporated organization and shall be bound by all action previously taker by the Michigan High School Footbal Coaches Association, as if such action had been taken for this organization Including the acceptance of members collection of annual dues, and election of officers and directors for specified terms.

#### Specific requirements

- To receive a 15 year certificate, must have been a coach in a particular sport for 15 school years
- To receive a 25 year certificate, must have been a coach in a particular sport for 25 school years
