

tall started on that hot August morning in 1991 when Bill Tucker told me that I had been elected to coach in the All Star Game of 1992. Joy and panic rushed through my mind.

After 33 years of football on all levels, Class D to Class A, dirt to Astro Richard accomplished as liaison was a thing to behold. He made it possible for the whole thing to come together. I was able to toss in my 2¢ on the offensive

We came up with a plan where everyone got to play an equal amount of time. Practice was no problem. Our "melting pot" team came together fast. Small town kids fit in with their urban brothers and we became a family. "West Pride" was rising and we wanted to make some history of our own.

Turf, with no assistants to ten assistants, 1 and 8 to 8 and 1, long hours, low pay, a wife who could make a feast from goulash, I felt qualified... but could I do the job?

Who were these coaches I was to work with? Pat Gallinagh and Richard Salani I had only read about in the newspaper. Heck, they even lived in a different time zone! Frank Altimore and Phil Leigeb... I had coached against them, but that was hardly a relationship! Jack Crabtree I knew from working with him on the Drug Awareness Committee. He sure had my respect! Where and how would I fit in?

Our first staff meeting had hardly begun when I realized that this group was very special. Each of us brought a creative something to the table. In ten minutes we were all working at 100%. I knew then that this was going to be an exciting experience.

We were fortunate to have Pat Gallinagh as our head coach. Organized, tough, energetic, enthusiastic and loud, with his head screwed on right, he set the pace and tone for our team: "Get the job done and have fun." Frank and Phil brought their expertise in our new offense and made it simple enough that even I could understand. Jack worked and re-worked our defense and had it going in no time. The job that

Stadium at The University of Nebraska, "Not the victory, but the action; not the goal but the game; in the deed the glory." This pretty much summed up our approach to the game.

This was the 12th All Star Game. Not long enough to have a real tradition, but it did have a history. We wanted our kids to know the story of this game and something of the great players who had performed in Spartan Stadium. Thus, "Bubba" was at all our practices and our kids knew that, "Duffy wasn't really dead." Every day was a history lesson and sometimes it got intense. The team wondered if Pat was going to give all a test at the end of the day.

night of the All Star Banquet. Proud parents and coaches, beaming young men and women, excellent food, a feeling of family and togetherness and a chance to thank God for where we



Nominations

Class AA, A schools may nominate three (3) players Class BB, B schools may nominate two (2) players Class CC, C & DD, D schools may nominate one (1) player

As in recent years only one player per school may be selected to play in the All Star Game.

There are three reasons for allowing larger schools more nominations:

- 1. Larger schools usually have larger squads.
- More nominations are made from the East, which has considerably fewer schools but predominantly more large schools.
- The proportion of nominations relative to school population is more nearly balanced. (East and West boundaries were determined by school population, not by the number of schools.)

When nominating players for the All Star Game coaches should consider the following Guidelines:

- Only nominate players that you feel have the ability to play with the best in the state.
- A player's character is vitally important. Only nominate players who will reflect positively on your school and on your community.
- Check with players to be sure that if selected they will play in the game... before nominating them.
- 4. DO NOT NOMINATE PLAYERS WHO ARE CON-SIDERING ANY OF THE SERVICE ACADEMIES (ARMY, AIR FORCE, NAVY). THEY WILL NOT PERMIT PLAYING IN ANY ALL STAR GAME.

If you have a player deserving of this honor please take the time to fill out the nomination form included with this Newsletter and mail it before the deadline:

DECEMBER 1, 1992!

Special Note:

Players selected to participate in the All Star Game will be required to **submit all materials relative to participation** (physicals, program materials, information sheets, etc.) by **MAY1,1993**... OR THEY WILL BE REPLACED BY THE 1st ALTERNATE AT THEIR POSITION.

Political Action Committee

Apply the Rule Equally to All Sports Sanctioned by the M.H.S.A.A.

The following position statement was developed by the Political Action Committee of the M.H.S.F.C.A. at the Summer Meeting. A copy was sent to M.H.S.A.A. Director, Jack Roberts.

The M.H.S.F.C.A. vehemently objects to the rule as stated in the M.H.S.A.A. Handbook: Section 11G, Subsection 1, Article E, Subarticle 2 which, as stated, denies football athletes equal access to professional coaching (by their high school coach), skill development, safety and injury awareness as granted to all other sports by the M.H.S.A.A. during the summer months and as granted by the Fourteenth Amendment of the U.S. Constitution.

The M.H.S.F.C.A. strongly recommends:

 That the M.H.S.A.A. eliminate the above rule as stated

OR

That the above rule be applied equally to all sports sanctioned by the M.H.S.A.A..

We, the M.H.S.F.C.A., strongly suggest that football coaches be allowed to fulfill their obligations and responsibilities as stated in the M.H.S.A.A.'s Coaches Guide, page 17, Appendix A (Which addresses responsibilities) and Appendix B (Which addresses safety).

Assistant Coach of Year Award

The award for Assistant Coach of the Year has been modified to take into account a coach who has been a head coach, then returned to an assistant position in order to stay active in the sport. A Nomination form, included in the school edition of this Newsletter points out the requirement of ten years experience as an assistant. Due November 15



Bearcat Running Back Drills

By Al Slamer Battle Creek Central H.S.

All drills should be developed and used to enhance skills that relate to successful execution at the running back position.

DRILL 1 STANCE-COURSE-FOOTWORK

Objective: Procedure: To insure all understand and develop the proper stance, steps, courses used in all running schemes. Backs align on a line 3 yards apart, 5 yards from L.O.S. (2 pt. and 3 pt. stances) On cadence-right,

left, straight ahead. Courses: Belly - Dive - Counter - Sweep - Option - Etc.

Coaching Points: Check feet, placement, width, weight distribution, first step, 2nd, 3rd, etc.

DRILL 2 BALL EXCHANGE DRILL

Objective:

To show backs how to accept the football from the QB. Seat (hand off) the ball with leverage in the

proper manner by "feel."

Procedure:

Backs line up in two opposite lines 2 yards apart with about 6 yards separating the two leading backs. First back with the ball runs one half the distance to the back facing him, stops, turns to his inside and hands ball off to approaching back - look handoff in. The back receiving the ball does not start until the handoff man stops and turns to his inside. He accepts the ball with his inside arm up, fingers spread, thumb pointing towards his chest, palm down. The bottom arm is belt high, palm up. The ball is accepted by folding the top arm down - both ends of ball are secured with the palms and fingers. The ball is pulled to the outside with the bottom hand. Run three steps, stop, turn inside and hand

off to the next man.

Coaching Points:

Make sure backs accept handoff with head and eyes up - repetition will develop the proper "feel."



DRILL 3 ZIG-ZAG DRILL

Objective:

To teach the proper arm to carry the ball in when running laterally.

Procedure:

Align cones or markers in a zig-zag formation. Each player has a ball. First in line goes on coaches

command. Thereafter, each goes when man in front has passed the first cone.


Coaching Points:

Make sure ball carriers have ball in OUTSIDE arm. Ball must be positioned properly (hand covering

cap). Shifting ball to outside arm should be done smoothly.

Variation:

Add players with hand dummie at cones and work straight arm techniques as well.





DRILL 4 STAY IN BOUNDS DRILL

To teach backs how to stay in bounds, attack defender, and maintain leverage on the football when running near the sideline.

Three players act as defenders spaced 5-10 yards apart and about 2 yards from the sideline.

Control the speed of the drill - work on form. Don't let players hit with the point of shoulder. Ball must be on the outside of runners body. Defenders do not attack runner until he has recovered from previous defender. Maintain leg drive throughout contact with defender.

DRILL 5 RUN BLOCKING DRILL

Objective:

To teach course, techniques and aiming points to block defenders.


Procedure:

Align dummies on strip in the position of the defenders. Coach stands in position to give command

to go one at a time. Players block and rotate to defensive bags.

Coaching Points:

Set up various blocking situations - isolation power (J), sweep (hook), arc, etc. Aiming point emphasize target area, i.e., inside hip, outside hip, middle, etc. Employ different defensive stunts to be picked up. Align backs in different formations YOU use.



DRILL 6 PASS PROTECTION DRILL

Objective:


To teach blocking course, technique, and form on drop back type passes.

Procedure:

Strip or other markers are used to represent the defensive linemen in the front desired. The backs act as either inside or outside LBer's and rush on coaches command. Backs align in desired formation - I, split, wishbone,

Coaching Points:

On command backs sprint out of stance to contact point of rushing defenders. Backs must use proper technique, i.e., feet and body and head position on contact. Defenders rush hard up-field to dummy or cone 5-7 yards deep QB. Backs rotate to defense and defense to offense.



DRILL 7 GAUNTLET DRILL

Objective: Procedure: To develop power running with ball emphasizing body position and ball security.

Use gauntlet machine if available - if not use hand hold pads. Players would stand with pads facing each other forming an alley or gauntlet. On command ball carriers run through gauntlet. If using players for gauntlet, emphasize that they apply pressure on ball carrier while allowing him to pass through gauntlet. Have ball carrier make cut on cone or other marker after leaving gauntlet.

Coaching Points:

Emphasize forward lean of body through gauntlet (45 degrees). Emphasize leg drive and high leg action. Drill can be modified to be used as a receiving drill. Catch pass then run through gauntlet.

DRILL 8 RUN AT 'EM

Objective:

To help backs to develop techniques and moves to elude defenders in the open

field.

Procedure:

Set up cones or other markers 10-15 yards apart. Each player starts with a ball. On coaches command back moves toward 1 st cone making move at cone, i.e spin, straight arm, power, etc. Other players proceed when back ahead of them is

about halfway through drill.

Coaching Points:

Ball carrier should run STRAIGHT AT cone, Making move to elude at last instant. Emphasize to backs to vary their techniques, not always using the same move. Add players with pads at cones. Defenders maintain positions and only reach for ball carriers. They do not chase. Rotate ball carriers and defenders.
