In 1983, Head Coach Bo Schembechler introduced "Woody" Hayes as the guest speaker for the evening. Guest speakers for this event have been Ara Parseghian, "Duffy" Daugherty, George Perles, and Herb Deromedi, all former head coaches at major universities have highlighted the evening. Also, University of Michigan head football coaches of the Michigan Wolverines, Bo Schembechler, Gary Moeller, Lloyd Carr, Rich Rodriguez, Brady Hoke, and Jim Harkema.

Larry Merx, Executive Director of the Association for the past 13 years, who stepped down this past December, yet still a member of the association since 1973, began the evening by giving an overview of the importance of the association. He highlighted the "Wall of Fame" and the "Virtual Hall of Fame" which are now displayed and available to all Michigan High School Football Fans. The "Wall of Fame" is prominently displayed at the University of Michigan Football Stadium, "The Big House", and the "Virtual Hall of Fame", is up and running on the M.H.S.F.C.A. web site (mhsfca.com). Complete credentials of all inductees are available and hopefully in the very near future you will be able to hear their acceptance speeches.

Andrew Pratley, Head Football Coach at St. Joseph High School, and President of the M.H.S.F.C.A. welcomed everyone to the Hall of Fame Banquet and Induction. "Welcome to the 2019 Michigan High School Football Coaches Association Hall of Fame Banquet. This evening, we honor a distinguished group of coaches who have left a lasting impression on the lives of many young men, as well as the communities in which they have served and continue to serve. ... Tonight I invite you to take it all innot just for the inductee that you are here to honor, but for all of these men as their stories are shared. You will hear of awards and accomplishments, but beyond that you will hear each man's story, the story of how they have impacted the game in our state and how they have impacted countless lives along the way."

Over the years, many things remain constant. One is the dedication of the members of the association who take care of the many details that involve organizing, maintaining, and preparing for the evening. These are the members who, behind the scenes, give of their time and energy, with no thanks needed, to make this an exceptional evening for the inductees, their families and friends. Without them, this event would not be the extraordinary evening that it is.

Another is the fact the inductees are men of achievement and integrity, who give credit to their families, their players, their fellow coaches, and their communities for their success.

Many coaches <u>should be</u> inducted into a hall of fame. <u>Some will and some will not</u>. It is important for us to remember, that it may not be the records, the championships, or the personal accolades that determine hall of fame consideration. It may be <u>the longevity</u>, <u>the effort</u>, <u>the enthusiasm</u>, <u>the contributions</u>, and/or <u>the sacrifices</u> that they have made. Or maybe, just maybe, it might be what they have <u>deep inside of them</u>, <u>their very best</u>, to determine if they are a hall of famer.

Because of the credentials compiled by these 14 outstanding individuals, these 14 outstanding coaches, their names will be enshrined forever in the M.H.S.F.C.A. Hall of Fame, displayed at the University of Michigan's football stadium. These gentlemen, in their careers, at the high school related level, in the state of Michigan, have coached for a combined total of: 464 seasons of coaching, have won 3,101 football games, and a few championships ... but... most importantly, they have touched the lives of countless young people.

Tom Fagan, past Hall of Fame Chairman expressed it best: "These coaches are: "The Best of the Best and the Finest of the Finest." This was the 37th Annual Induction. Including this year's inductees, the M. H. S. F. C. A. has inducted 755 of the finest high school football coaches in the state of Michigan into the Hall of fame, and each induction has a personality all its own. ---"It Is The Greatest Profession In The World. MHSAA SCRIMMAGE RULE EXPLAINED

n recent years, the MHSAA rule regarding preseason scrimmages has been a relatively hot topic for debate. The actual rule is below:

SECTION 9 (C)—A school may not take part in an interscholastic scrimmage session with other schools until practice has occurred on nine separate days (which may include the day of the scrimmage). A football team (any level) shall not participate in a football scrimmage with or against any other team(s) after the last contest

(regular season or MHSAA tournament) for that team. (From MHSAA Handbook)

It is important to note that the ninth separate day of practice MAY include a scrimmage or joint practice with another school (technically defined as a scrimmage). Therefore, it is acceptable for schools to scrimmage on the second Tuesday of the season, IF both schools have practiced for nine consecutive days, including the second Tuesday.

MSU SUMMER COACHES' SCHOOL

he Institute for the Study of Youth Sports at Michigan State University is hosting their 5th annual Summer Coaches' School. This is a two-day coaching workshop with the purpose of helping coaches learn the most current science in coaching information. Expert presenters will conduct workshops on various topics such as athlete mental health, navigating social issues, working with parents, principles of training and conditioning, using and evaluating reinforcement, and mental skills training.

The coaches school also serves as MHSAA CAP Levels 7 and 8 and coaches are able to earn those credentials through attendance. Registration for both days is \$130.00 and for a single day is \$80 (a group rate is available for groups of four coaches or more.)

MICHIGAN HS FOOTBALL BILL SUBSTANTIALLY CUTS FULL-CONTACT PRACTICE HOURS

ichigan has become the second state to drastically limit high school football contact hours in practice in accordance with guidelines of safety advocacy group Practice Like Pros.

The Michigan High School Athletic Association representative council passed a bill that prescribing the following limitations on full-contact practices:

- •In-season reduction from 90 minutes per week to 30
- •Preseason reduced from three hours per day plus scrimmages to six total hours per week, including scrimmages
- Maintain the ban on full-contact in spring and summer football.

The association is following the footsteps of New Jersey, who in February implemented similar rules but with 15 minutes per week in-season, not 30 like Michigan.

MHSAA executive director Mark Uyl said in February most schools already follow guidelines similar to the ones that were established this week.

40-SECOND PLAY CLOCK, POSTSEASON INSTANT REPLAY AMONG FOOTBALL CHANGES

n an effort to establish a more consistent time period between downs in high school football, the play clock will start at 40 seconds instead of 25 seconds in many cases beginning with the 2019 season.

This change was one of seven rules revisions recommended by the National Federation of State High School Associations (NFHS) Football Rules Committee at its January 13-15 meeting in Indianapolis, which were subsequently approved by the NFHS Board of Directors.

The play clock will continue to start at 25 seconds (a) prior to a try following a score, (b) to start a period or overtime series, (c) following administration of an inadvertent whistle, (d) following a charged time-out, (e) following an official's time-out, with a few exceptions, and (f) following the stoppage of the play clock by the referee for any other reason. In all other cases, 40 seconds will be placed on the play clock and start when the ball is declared dead by a game official.

Previously, the ball was marked ready-for-play when, after it had been placed for a down, the referee gave the ready-for-play signal and the 25-second count began. Beginning next season, in addition to the above situations when the 25-second count is used, the ball will also be ready for play when, starting immediately after the ball

has been ruled dead by a game official after a down, the ball has been placed on the ground by the game official and the game official has stepped away to position.

"The entire committee needs to be commended for its thorough discussion regarding the move to a 40-second play clock, except in specific situations that will still have a 25-second play clock to show play is ready to begin," said Todd Tharp, assistant director of the Iowa High School Athletic Association and chair of the NFHS Football Rules Committee. "This is one of the most substantial game administration rules changes to be approved in the past 10 years, and without detailed experimentation from several state associations over the past three years, along with cooperation of the NFHS Football Game Officials Manual Committee, all the elements needed to approve this proposal would not have been in place.

NOTE: This rule change does NOT require schools to have a physical 40 second play clock. This time will be kept by the back judge, as before. If schools opt to use a physical clock, it must be operated by a person other than the regular clock operator.
