# **Busting A Culture Of Entitlement**

recent headline pulled from the sports pages read: "Coach Says Athlete Entitlement a Factor in Her Retirement." It was the story of veteran women's college basketball coach Rhonda Rompola, who decided to end her 25-year coaching career in large part because, "Kids are not as coachable as they were years ago."

I frequently hear coaches lament that today's athletes are more self-centered. This widely held belief is often attributed to growing up in what is sometimes referred to as the "selfie age." One of the more memorable experiences I had with this issue came from an exchange with an Olympic coach. The coach emailed me from overseas asking for advice about how to "bust the culture of athlete entitlement." The coach had arranged to extend the trip to allow the athletes to train in some of their sport's most renowned training grounds. Instead of being excited and grateful for "getting to stay," the coach was taken aback when the teenaged athletes grumbled about "having to stay" longer.

It is true that today's generation of young athletes is growing up in a different culture, one in which individual achievements are often glorified and celebrated at the expense of collective achievements and self-sacrifice. Nowhere is this more evident than in the typical youth sport setting where parents aggressively push for their sons and daughters to get noticed, in the hopes of securing a college scholarship. However, coaches have long had to deal with athlete entitlement. Former NBA coach Pat Riley, who won four championships with the Los Angeles Lakers three decades ago, famously wrote an entire book about what he referred to as "the disease of me."

The most effective way to bust a culture of athlete entitlement is to actively build and reinforce a culture of athlete accountability. A three-pronged approach is most effective for creating this type of team culture:

- 1. Use messages to clarify the concept.
- 2. Practice team activities to develop and recognize the desired behaviors.
- 3. Model the message and the behaviors to reinforce accountability.

Printing personal accountability messages on t-shirts and player handbooks are examples of strategies frequently used to clarify the concept of selflessness. As part of his accountability-building efforts, former professional football coach Mike Smith gave all of his players and staff bracelets with 'No Complaining' printed on them. The strategy worked so well the team declared that year their 'No Complaining Season' with many players wearing the bracelets throughout the season.

Some other common examples of messages coaches use to reinforce the idea of athlete accountability include:

- Play for the name on the front of your jersey, not the one on the back. (Herb Brooks)
- We win together, we lose together, and we refuse to point fingers at one another. (Mike Matheny)
- Never make the same mistake twice, because the second time you make it it's not a mistake, it's a choice. (Pat Fitzgerald)
- Focus more on being the best player for the team instead of the best player on the team. (Bo Hanson)

Coaches working with high school or adolescent athletes might also consider using the following team activity as a way to clarify the difference between "selfless" and "selfish."

Prior to a team meeting, generate a list of related words for "selfless" and for "selfish." Common synonyms for selfless are gallant, honorable, noble, brave, heroic, gracious, altruistic, thoughtful, coachable and respectful. For selfish, coaches might use egotistic, greedy, self-centered, narcissistic, self-absorbed, vain, conceited, arrogant, pompous and boastful.

Create two word search puzzles – one for selfish words and one for selfless words. Many free online puzzle generators are available, and a typical word search puzzle will take less than 5 minutes to create (<a href="http://puzzlemaker.discoveryeducation.com/WordSearchSetupForm.asp">http://puzzlemaker.discoveryeducation.com/WordSearchSetupForm.asp</a>).

Print the two puzzles on opposite sides of the same sheet of paper, and make one copy for each athlete. Do not identify the puzzle topics.

At the team meeting present the word search puzzles as a competition. Either have athletes compete individually or in small groups to see who can complete the two word puzzles first.

Debrief the activity by explaining that the words on one side of the worksheet define a selfish athlete while the words on the other side of the worksheet characterize a selfless athlete. Ask the athletes to then identify specific behaviors that correspond with some of the words on each side of the worksheet. What are examples of an athlete acting self-absorbed?

Finish by asking the athletes which side of the worksheet they would like to have their name written on if their teammates and coaches were asked to describe them. Have them sign their name on the selfless side of the worksheet. Collect the worksheets, make a photocopy to keep in each athlete's file and return the original to the athlete. Revisit the worksheet throughout the year – both when recognizing selfless behaviors or when an athlete behaves selfishly.

At the same time, building a durable culture of athlete accountability requires much more than clarifying messages. Behavioral standards and routines are needed to help athletes learn selfless and team-oriented behaviors. Many successful teams use a variation of The Hard Hat Award, described in detail in the book of the same title by Jon Gordon. After each practice or competition an athlete is selected – sometimes by the coaching staff, sometimes by teammates – who best exemplifies team values and selflessness. The athlete is then presented with the team "hard hat," or some other representative symbol, and keeps it until it is awarded to the next recipient.

Another common strategy for teaching athletes how to behave selflessly is to design team activities around the theme of "everything earned, nothing given." Newly hired University of Virginia football coach Bronco Mendenhall made news recently with this approach. Even previously taken-for-granted givens such as jersey numbers now have to be earned. Before the season starts, the team will vote to determine the order in which athletes will pick a jersey number, based on demonstrated work ethic and commitment to the team.

Finally, the simplest and most powerful way to develop selfless athletes is to model the message and behaviors on a daily basis as a coach. Coaches need to lead by example because athletes are always watching them. Coaches must demonstrate that they are not above the same standards for selflessness that they set for their athletes.

St. Louis Cardinals manager Mike Matheny is a tremendous case in point. In one well known example, he organized a team scrimmage in which the losing team was responsible for tidying up the clubhouse that day. Although not participating in the scrimmage, he assigned himself to the least desirable task of cleaning all of the toilets regardless of which side won the intrasquad game. The importance of coach modeling is succinctly captured in an oft-recited poem written by legendary basketball coach John Wooden:

No written word, no spoken plea.

Can teach our youth what they should be.

Nor all the books on all the shelves.

It's what the teachers are, themselves.

Although each generation of athletes presents coaches with unique challenges, dealing with entitled or selfish athletes is not one. Athletes have always been susceptible to moments of self-absorption or selfish behavior. Instead of lamenting "today's kids" or hoping that athlete entitlement doesn't infect your team, create a culture of selflessness by using messages to clarify the concept, teaching accountability through team activities and rituals, and modeling the desired behaviors as a coach.

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# Detroit Lions/Farm Bureau Insurance High School Football Coach of the Week Program

ach week throughout the nine-week Michigan High School football regular season, one coach that best develops his players' character, discipline, and football skill in addition to emphasizing player health and safety in their program, will be recognized for his commitment to the team, school, and community. The winner is selected by a panel of high school football media members - Mick McCabe (Detroit Free Press), Hugh Bernreuter (Saginaw News), Bret Bakita (WOOD Radio-106.9 FM, ESPN 96.1 FM-Fox 17/Grand Rapids) and James Cook (Traverse City Record-Eagle).

The 2016 program will award \$22,000 to aid in the development and promotion of high school football in the state of Michigan, thanks to contributions from the Detroit Lions, the NFL Foundation and presenting partner, Farm Bureau Insurance of Michigan.

Each winning coach during the regular season receives a \$2,000 donation to his school's football program. At the conclusion of the Michigan High School Football season, the Lions select the High School Football Coach of the Year. The Coach of the Year receives a \$4,000 donation to his school's football program in addition to being nominated for the Don Shula NFL High School Football Coach of the Year. All winners receive a certificate signed by Lions' head coach Jim Caldwell and National Football League (NFL) commissioner Roger Goodell, a personalized game ball as well as acknowledgement at an upcoming Lions home game.

Currently in its' 20th year, the Detroit Lions High School Coach of the Week program has awarded \$367,000 to high school football programs throughout the state of Michigan. # Week #1 Corey Parker-River Rouge

Detroit, MI—The Detroit Lions have named Corey Parker of River Rouge High School the week one recipient of the 2016 Farm Bureau Insurance of Michigan High School Football Coach of the Week Program.

Coach Parker led his Panthers to a 34-16 victory over Chelsea at the Prep Kickoff Classic during opening weekend of the high school football season. Currently in his 11th season at River Rouge and his 8th year as head coach, Parker has directed the Panthers to six straight playoff appearances and has a career record of 56-21. River Rouge was the Division 5 state runner-up in 2015. This Thursday, River Rouge plays at Ann Arbor Huron.

In terms of player health and safety, the River Rouge football staff stresses the importance of Hawk tackling for 7th-12th graders. Hawk tackling is a shoulder leverage tackling system, rooted in rugby fundamentals, and designed to take the head out of the tackle to help make tackling safer. In combination with teaching Hawk tackling, the River Rouge football staff conducts auxiliary exercises designed to strengthen the neck muscles. Because the neck is an important part of keeping the head up to make a safer tackle, strengthening the neck results in stronger neck muscles, which can help cushion against and lessen the linear and rotational forces that cause concussions.

# Week #2 Ron Bindi-Charlevoix

Detroit, MI—The Detroit Lions have named Ron Bindi of Charlevoix High School the week two recipient of the 2016 Farm Bureau Insurance of Michigan High School Football Coach of the Week Program.

Bindi, who's currently in his 37th year in coaching and 4th as head coach at Charlevoix, led his Rayders to a 22-14 victory over Boyne City. Bindi has also been a head coach at Bellaire, reaching an 8-man football runner up berth in 2012, and U of D Jesuit, along with numerous assistant coaching positions during his career. Charlevoix, who is currently ranked number 2 in Division 6, is 2-0 and travels to Mancelona to take on the Ironmen in a Northern Michigan Football League-Leaders Division game.

In terms of player health and safety, the Charlevoix football program employs a full-time athletic trainer to attend all practices and games. The Charlevoix Athletic Department also provides baseline concussion testing for all high school student-athletes in contact sports such as football, basketball, soccer and wrestling. This baseline concussion testing and post-injury tests are computerized assessments that measure reaction time, memory capacity, speed of mental processing, and executive functioning of the brain.

# Week #3 Roger Bearss-Millington

Detroit, MI—The Detroit Lions have named Roger Bearss of Millington High School the week three recipient of the 2016 Farm Bureau Insurance of Michigan High School Football Coach of the Week Program.

Bearss led his Cardinals to a 37-16 victory over Essex-ville-Garber to go 3-0 on the season. Bearss has a record of 59-12 (83%) at Millington and has led the Cardinals to the Michigan High School Football playoffs in each of his 7 seasons. Prior to coming to Millington, Bearss held head coaching positions at Bad Axe (2 years), Frankfort (4 years), Newberry (3 years), and Frankenmuth (5 years). He has a career record of 128-79 (61.8%). Millington, currently ranked Number 1 in Division 6, hosts Birch Run on Friday, September 16 in a Tri-Valley Conference-East Division battle.

#### Week #4 Walker Zaban-Dearborn Fordson

Detroit, MI—The Detroit Lions have named Walker Zaban of Dearborn Fordson High School the week four recipient of the 2016 Farm Bureau Insurance of Michigan High School Football Coach of the Week Program.

Zaban led his Tractors to a 49-6 victory over Garden City to 4-0 on the season. In his 10 seasons as head coach, Zaban has a record of 76-26 (74.5%) at Fordson and has led the Tractors to the Michigan High School Football playoffs each of the last 9 seasons. Prior to taking on the head coaching duties, Zaban spent 13 years as an assistant coach at Fordson. Fordson is currently ranked No. 4 in Division 1 and travels to Redford Thurston on Friday, September 23 to take on the Eagles in a Western Wayne Athletic Conference-Blue Division battle.

Regarding player health & safety, through athletic training partner Beaumont, concussion baseline testing is provided for football, soccer and volleyball student-athletes. These baseline tests are used to assess an athlete's balance and brain function, including learning and memory skills and the ability to pay attention and concentrate, as well as the presence of any concussion symptoms. The Fordson Varsity Alumni Club also sponsors free heart check testing for interested student-athletes. The student heart check, also conducted by Beaumont, helps detect children, ages 13-18, who are at risk of sudden cardiac arrest. This type of test is not typically included within the routine physical required for playing interscholastic sports.





# **Promoting High School Football to Young Parents**

fter consulting a variety of interested parties, the MHSFCA has started a project promoting high school football to young parents, parents who have not yet made the decision about whether to allow their kids to play high school football. The project involves asking players, administrators and others, variations on the question "What has football taught you about life, how has it made you a better person?" We have recorded the responses and posted them on the Michigan High School Football Coaches Association Facebook page.

You can see what we have accumulated so far (this is an ongoing project) by searching Facebook for our page or by going to MHSFCA.com and clicking on the red box on the right to connect to our Facebook page.

The goal is to provide young parents with information that will help them make an informed decision. They know the risks. We want to point out the benefits, with our premise being that the benefits FAR outweigh the risks.

We strongly encourage you do take-up this project with your own players, administrators, etc. Get the video on your team's Facebook page, on your school's website/Facebook, on your parent organization's web page/Facebook, get it to your local media outlets, and GET IT TO US!

There are several reasons that many of our programs are suffering reduced numbers of participants. One, that we may be able to influence, is the perception that injuries are rampant and that our game is all about winning. We know that there is much, much more than the win/loss record. We teach our kids each day the values that will make them better people, better citizens. We need to make sure parents - that don't know us (and don't necessarily trust us, as coaches) - know what our players are learning. What better way to do this than from the mouths of players who have been through the system and learned first hand what makes high school football such a great game!

# **Duties of Regional Directors**

- I. Directors are responsible for the management of the affairs, funds and property of the association.
- II. Directors will promote membership in their region:

  - B. Contact delinquent members urging re-enrollment.
- III. Represent the interests of the Association and his region at all Association Meetings.

  - B. At the Summer Meetings, participate in committee work and bring names of honorary membership for nomination. Be available to help with whatever needs to be done to make the MHSFCA All-Star Game successful.
  - C. At the Fall meeting, come prepared with Coach of the Year responsibilities completed.
    - 1. Contact any coach from your region receiving a Regional Coach of the Year award.
    - 2. Make sure each honored coach is in attendance at the January clinic for his presentation.
  - D. Prior to January elections, if running for re-election,

- be sure your name has been properly placed on the ballot. If not seeking re-election, encourage at least two coaches from your region to run.
- E. Attend the MHSFCA Winners Circle Clinic and be prepared to assume at least one Clinic responsibility. Bring a gift for a door prize.
- IV. Serve as an active member of whatever committee you were appointed to by the President.
- V. Report to your region all urgent business transacted or discussed as soon as possible. Keep a record of all expenses incurred in such cases of necessary communication and submit to the Executive Director for reimbursement.
- VI. Be ethical in all your football relationships so as to be a model to the coaches in your region.

# **Undue Influence**

or this edition of the MHSFCA newsletter, we have been asked to provide a summary and guidance of the Undue Influence rule, which more simply put, is the anti-recruiting rule that all MHSAA member schools must follow.

In 2007, the United States Supreme Court issued a rare unanimous decision that state high school athletic association rules should prevent and penalize the recruiting of students into high schools because of athletics. Member schools of the MHSAA have agreed to follow this rule, along with all others, which apply equally to public schools, charter schools and nonpublic schools.

A long-standing rule, Undue Influence, involves cooperation and compliance by more than just the athletes and coaching staff. The anti-recruiting rule states that a violation can occur if a person "directly or indirectly associated with the school" encourages or secures the attendance of a student because of athletics. "Directly or indirectly associated with the school" may include but not be limited to parents of players, booster club members, alumni and representatives of non-school athletic programs. Often it is the non-school environment (AAU or youth sports) where inappropriate recruiting rule violations occur and where vigilance is needed.

Parents or others should not attempt to encourage or secure attendance by a student because of sports. They should not attempt to build up the roster by encouraging a good athlete to enroll at one school or another, or target the best athletes for enrollment. Athletic recruiting is a violation, whether to a middle school student beginning the 9th grade or a high school student transferring between schools.

Attempting to encourage a student or parent to attend any school because the student is an athlete risks the school's reputation, their entire program and the future involvement of adults with that high school. Violation of the anti-recruiting rule can result in penalties to the school and athletic program along with ineligibility for a coach or a recruited athlete. It can also result in a parent, alumnus or supporter being banned from attendance and involvement with the school. All schools must strongly urge all those who support any school to follow the spirit and letter of the anti-athletic recruiting rules.

In the present day, schools of all types often market or advertise to either retain or attract students. The antiathletic recruiting rule must be understood and followed by those who support a school to protect legitimate schoolwide efforts to attract students who make their decisions free from athletic recruiting. Decisions about what school to attend would involve many factors, including athletics. But because athletics is based on competition, discussions about sports are only allowed as part of general school presentations. Non-athletic department school administrators and staff deal with admissions and are assigned to provide information to students and parents about any school. People interested in enrollment should be referred to administrators responsible for admissions.

Schools need to diligently follow this rule. Insist that your school's staff follow these rules in both letter and spirit. Anti-recruiting rules require the awareness and adherence of an entire school community to ensure a level playing field in school sports.
