Duties of Regional Directors

- I. Directors are responsible for the management of the affairs, funds and property of the association.

ver had a question about how to do your job as a coach and not know where to turn for an answer? Need the name of an experienced coach who you could talk to in confidence about answering that question - or solving that problem? If you have something you need help with, look over the list, contact one (or more) of the Coach-To-Coach volunteers. Each of the volunteers has several years of coaching experience. Get their advice. It's free and confidential.

You must be a member of MHSFCA to access this service. Join online at MHSFCA.com be sure your name has been properly placed on the ballot. If not seeking re-election, encourage at least two coaches from your region to run.

- E. Attend the MHSFCA Winners Circle Clinic and be prepared to assume at least one Clinic responsibility. Bring a gift for a door prize.
- IV. Serve as an active member of whatever committee you were appointed to by the President.
- V. Report to your region all urgent business transacted or discussed as soon as possible. Keep a record of all expenses incurred in such cases of necessary communication and submit to the Executive Director for reimbursement.
- VI. Be ethical in all your football relationships so as to be a model to the coaches in your region.

Recruiting

The Recruiting Process:

College coaches will continue to acquire prospect information from high school coaches. They <u>discount</u> <u>information from commercial recruiting services</u>. These relationships are based on a trust built over time. Every college coach wants a truthful relationship with the high school coach. Inflated numbers, dishonest evaluations can hurt the high school coach's future recruits.

The role of the high school coach:

- 1. Supply viewable game tapes, in winter of junior year for most D1, middle to end of season for seniors.
- 2. Provide accurate student bio information and a copy of the high school transcript.
- 3. Complete the NCAA approved recruiting services forms so the prospects are listed in the publication.
- 4. Attend the MHSFCA December recruiting fairs. A number of colleges will only recruit our state at these fairs.

The role of the Student-Athlete:

- 1. Attend College Camps: This is where most college scholarships are awarded. Attend and perform at the different college camps in front of college coaches. College coaches want information they can trust. Performing on a college campus and against other prospects can reinforce a prospect's evaluation. Camp dates are on every web site.
- 2. Game Tapes: College coaches evaluate student athletes based on real game tape footage. Make sure the college coaches have your game tape at the appropriate time (December of Junior year for D1). If they feel you are a real prospect, they will connect with you or your coach (given NCAA restrictions). The higher the division desired, the earlier the tapes are needed. For example, some D1 offers could be based on sophomore tape and most are based on junior game tape.

Coaches, Student Athletes and Parents:

- 1. Understand the NCAA and NAIA Academic Eligibility rules before the student athlete's ninth grade year begins. The NCAA continues to add more restrictions to their eligibility process. Academic eligibility begins with the first semester report card in the 9th grade. All students and parents need to calculate the students NCAA CORE GPA every semester beginning with the 9th grade.
- 2. The overall GRADE POINT AVERAGE (GPA) is the most important number in the recruiting process. The higher the GPA above a 3.0, the more athletic opportunities are available. The most important high school report card is the first semester of the student athletes ninth grade.
- 3. Academic Scholarships are Guaranteed: College athletic scholarships are limited and in high demand. Academic scholarships are available at all colleges and universities. All students can earn academic scholarships but athletic offers are determined by the evaluation of college coaches. Again, the most important report card is high school is the first semester of the 9th grade year.





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Walt Braun remembered at Marysville stadium "He was one of the greatest men ever."

ridays always were Walt Braun's days. Every Friday night during his 33 years of coaching Marysville football, the bleachers were crammed with spectators hoping to see one of his hundreds of wins as a coach. People showed up in their favorite jersey, the band blared the fight song and seeing a Viking costume in the sea of people was almost the standard.

On Friday, August 15,,2014 at the late Braun's memorial service, it was just another classic Vikings Friday at the stadium named after him.

Once again, the bleachers were filled for the legend. Instead of watching one of his wins, they told one of hundreds of stories about their old ball coach. Former players and fans showed up in their old, worn out blue jerseys. The band played for him one last time. Sure enough, a man clad in a Viking costume was present.

Braun's Marysville-blue casket was also stationed on the same sideline where he coached his players, right on the 50 yard line. It could easily have been a somber day, but the memory of Bruan's sense of humor and appreciation for blonde and redneck jokes wouldn't allow it.

"If a blonde and a brunette both dive out of a plane, who would hit the ground first?" Rev. Brendon Aspenson of the Community Wesleyan Church asked to start the service in Braun-like fashion. "The brunette, because the blonde would stop and ask for directions."

The joke was followed by one of Braun's eight grandchildren, Mikayla Warner, playing "Amazing Grace" on a trumpet.

From there, the memories began. Dave Houck, who coached with Braun, was one of the first people to speak about Braun's impact on the community. He asked for every former player, coach, cheerleader, teacher and administrator who knew Braun to stand up.

Hardly anyone was still sitting on the bleachers. One of those standing was Jeff Poulsen, whose family moved when he was 3 years old so he could be coached by Braun one day. Even though Poulsen never got to play under Braun, he still showed up to many flag football, wrestling and baseball contests while he was growing up. "It didn't matter how old you were, he knew your name," the 2001 Marysville High graduate said. "He was one of the greatest men ever."

To end Houck's speech, he pointed out the ser-

vice was held on the same day football teams can start full-contact practice — or "Christmas Day," as Braun would have called it.

Braun's longtime friend Dick Denuyl spent half an hour telling jokes and reflecting on Braun's knack for a laugh.

Denuyl told the story of how Braun once moved all the Denuyls' furniture into the basement, making them think they were robbed while



they had been playing euchre next door. Denuyl said he got his revenge by taking all the tires off Braun's car.

The Rev. Aspenson closed the service stating, "Somewhere in heaven, a much more organized game of football is being played."

Before the band cued up the fight song to end the memorial, three doves were released from their cage. They flew over the 50 yard line of the field Braun once dominated. They turned left and soared over the school where he'd changed so many lives. From there, the doves disappeared into the city

that Braun helped put on the map, one Friday at a time.

Just Give Us One • September, 2014

ike everyone reading this article, I absolutely love the game of football. It has been a life-long passion that has taught me countless lessons over the years as a player, coach and official. It is a game that teaches important values such as hard work, dedication, teamwork and sacrificing individual goals or attention for the betterment of the entire program. In my role with the MHSAA, one of my daily goals in this office is to make sure it continues to be a great game for future players, coaches and officials to come.

Over the past ten years, the average age of a MHSAA football official has slowly crept higher and higher. The number of young people getting involved in officiating has dwindled as we have less 20-and 30-year olds becoming involved than we had a decade ago. When watching Friday night highlights of games on the late news from around that state, I almost always focus on the officials that are in the background covering the play (yes, I actually do this). Most of the time, those officials appear to be very "experienced" in terms of their approximate age and I often wish to see more youthful faces with the mobile bodies that often come in that younger "packaging".

Whenever I get to speak to a group of coaches in any sport, a criticism I hear in each and every meeting is that we don't have enough <u>good</u> officials. Most coaches will acknowledge we have some outstanding officials but will then quickly add that we don't have enough of this very top group to work each and every game. Truth be told, I agree with this sentiment 100%. I hear you. We not only need MORE officials but we need more <u>GOOD</u> officials, especially more good <u>YOUNG</u> officials. In all levels of sports, the push for more quality officials is an everyday goal. This goal is no different in the NFL office than it is in the MHSAA office.

So how do we go about working on this problem? This is where we need the help of each MHSFCA member. If each football playing school at the end of this season could identify ONE senior that has the maturity, personality, confidence and interest in becoming an official, our problems of not enough young officials would quickly disappear. Our campaign is simple- we need each school to just give us <u>one</u> senior each year to add to the officiating ranks as they head off to college or enter the workforce full time.

We realize officiating is not for everyone. It does take a special person to be an official who has the skills of decisiveness, self-confidence and can set boundaries for how much verbal back-and-forth is appropriate. Our experience has shown us that former players who have a "feel" for the game become much better officials much faster than those that never played the sport. Over the past decade as a college referee, the very best umpire I ever worked with was a former college offensive lineman. He knew exactly what linemen were being taught, what they were trying to do and was the very best communicator with kids in the trenches on both sides of the ball. He simply had a knack for cleaning up problems and shutting down situations when they first happened so we were just playing football inside, not babysitting kids around the piles and after the whistle. This came from someone being "in the game" who simply transitioned from the uniform with a helmet and shoulder pads to a different uniform of a striped shirt and whistle. We need more of our former players to be made aware of this opportunity to stay in the game and on the field.

I truly believe that every school's football program has one graduating senior each year that fits this mold. It's a way for kids who have finished their playing career to continue to look forward to that next football game for years to come. There was no better feeling than sitting in a classroom early in the week as a high school student looking forward to Friday night's game. As an official, that feeling is still there each fall Monday morning while in the office, job site, sales meeting or home knowing that you, too, have a football game this coming Friday night.

Please know we will allow that senior from your school to register with the MHSAA for FREE that first year out of school! We are looking for kids with a true interest in officiating, and we ask that you simply send that player's name and contact information to us here at the MHSAA and we will do the rest. he Detroit Lions High School Football Coach of the Week (COTW) program will recognize and honor those Michigan high school football coaches who continuously demonstrate hard work and dedication to their football programs by creating successful football teams and players both on and off the field. It also will continue to provide high schools with financial assistance through \$1,000 grants to maintain and upgrade their football programs with the purchase of new helmets, equipment, etc.

We will conduct the Detroit Lions High School Football Coach of the Week program for the nine weeks of the regular season and then select a Detroit Lions High School Football Coach of the Year (COTY) at the conclusion of the state championships. The Detroit Lions High School Football Coach of the Year will receive a \$3,000 grant for his program. At the Detroit Lions vs. Minnesota Vikings game on December 14, we will acknowledge all our COTW winners as well as our COTY selection with tickets to the game, a pregame brunch, and an on-field acknowledgement ceremony.

of the Year will be automatically nominated for the Don Shula NFL High School Coach of the Year Award program. The Don Shula NFL High School Football Coach of the Year winner is honored at a Super Bowl Press Conference; receives a \$10K contribution and a \$15K grant for his football program while finalists receive \$2500 cash rewards and \$5K football program grants.

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For the third straight year, we are emphasizing player health and safety in this program by requiring our voting panel members to consider nominees' activities/philosophies to advance and promote player health and safety in their programs. Along with the on-field recognition, we are looking at what the recipient does in terms of player health and safety, which includes the recipients' philosophies on teaching the fundamentals of the game, proper tackling techniques (do they adhere to the Heads Up Tackling curriculum?), concussion management practices, adherence to heat and hydration guidelines, etc.

Week 1

Detroit, MI—The Detroit Lions have named Kevin Townsend of Freeland High School the week one recipient of the 2014 Farm Bureau Insurance of Michigan High School Football Coach of the Week Program. Coach Townsend led his Falcons to a 42-0 victory over Lake Fenton during opening weekend of the high school football season. In his 11th year of coaching and his 9th season as head coach at Freeland, Townsend has directed the Falcons to playoff appearances in each of the last 6 seasons. Townsend's career record is 50-32. This Friday, Freeland plays their home opener against Ovid-Elsie in a Tri-Valley Conference Central Division game. The Freeland Athletic Department also places a strong emphasis on player health and safety. Football studentathletes, along with other Freeland student-athletes, participate in baseline concussion testing through Axon Sports. The Freeland athletic trainer also uses the Sports Concussion Assessment Tool (SCAT 2), the modified Balance Error Scoring System (BESS) test and the reaction stick ruler test in evaluating student-athletes for concussions. The Athletic Department is also working with the University of Michigan-Flint's physical therapy department in a balance study called Quantifying Balance Performance in High School Adolescents using Portable Force Plates System. The study will be used to understand the recovery of students who have suffered from concussions.

Week 2

Detroit, MI—The Detroit Lions have named Dan Boggan of Lansing Sexton High School the week two recipient of the 2014 Farm Bureau Insurance of Michigan High School Football Coach of the Week Program. On September 6, Coach Boggan led his Big Reds to an 18-8 victory over Monroe. In his 19th year of coaching at Sexton and his 13th season as head coach, Boggan has directed the Big Reds to playoff appearances in 8 seasons, including an appearance in last year's Division 4 state semi-finals. Boggan's career record is 84-45. This Friday, Sexton, currently ranked #2 in Division 4, goes on the road to take on Grand Ledge in a Capital Area Activities Conference Blue Division game. In terms of student-athlete health and safety, the Sexton Athletic Department works with the Michigan State University Sports Medicine department, who administers ImPact concussion testing for all football student-athletes. ImPACT (Immediate Post- Concussion Assessment and Cognitive Testing) provides trained clinicians with neurocognitive assessment tools and services that have been medically accepted as state-of-the-art best practices as part of determining safe return to play decisions.

Week 3

Detroit, MI-The Detroit Lions have named Gus Kapolka of Cedar Springs High School the week three recipient of the 2014 Farm Bureau Insurance of Michigan High School Football Coach of the Week Program. On September 12, Kapolka led his Red Hawks to a 46-7 victory over Monroe to go to 3-0 on the season. Currently in his 2nd year at Cedar Springs, Kapolka spent 9 seasons as a head coach at Manistee, taking the Chippewas to 3 state playoff berths. He also spent 4 years as an assistant at Boyne City and 4 years as an assistant at Warren Lincoln. This Friday, the Red Hawks go on the road to take on Grand Rapids Catholic Central. In terms of student-athlete health and safety at Cedar Springs High School, all Cedar Springs coaches from varsity to the middle school are first aid, CPR, and AED certified. Student-athletes in varsity football, boys/girls soccer and wrestling are also administered baseline concussion testing through Concussion Vital Signs. This scientifically based system, as part of a medical evaluation, helps facilitate confident return-to-play decisions, while helping to protect the future of student athletes in sports, academics, and life.

MHSFCA Partnership with NFL and American Cancer Society (ACA) A Crucial Catch Game

• Recruit students and parents to sell A Crucial Catch football cutouts at lunches or games for \$1 or more and create a "Wall of Hope" for your school.


